On October 19, 2019 at approximately 12:25 PM, Inspire Party held a secret meeting in which a Constitution for the Party was adopted. The previous complaint filed by this plaintiff outlines why this meeting in and of itself was an elections code violation. In addition to this, however, Inspire Party violated election rules by adopting a Constitution that is directly contradictory of the regulations for student organizations set by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement.

Code 746.0 states that "All political parties must comply with all rules and regulations governing student organizations set forth by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement." The Department of Student Activities and Involvement has set forth a guideline for the constitutions of student organizations, which Inspire Party is as set forth by code 741.2, which states that "The Supervisor of Elections shall submit a copy of each political party's registration information to the Director of the Department of Student Activities and Involvement for registration as a student organization." One of the guidelines for student organizations that the Department of Student Activities and Involvement sets forth is that Article IV of each constitution must include certain number of verbatim sections on non-discrimination, sexual harassment, hazing, and responsibility to report.

Pertinent to this complaint is Section D: Responsibility to Report. According to the document published by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement, constitutions for student organizations must include the following section verbatim (emphasis in bold added by the plaintiff): "If this organization becomes aware of any such conduct described in this article, [Name of organization] will report it immediately to Student Activities and Involvement, the Director of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution, or the University's Title IX Coordinator." In contrast, Inspire Party's constitution, in Article III, Section 4: Responsibility to Report, states (emphasis in bold added by the plaintiff) "If this organization becomes aware of any such conduct described in this article, Inspire Party may report it immediately to Student Activities and Involvement, the Director of Student to Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution, or the University's Title IX Coordinator." In contrast, Inspire Party's constitution, in Article III, Section 4: Responsibility to Report, states (emphasis in bold added by the plaintiff) "If this organization becomes aware of any such conduct described in this article, Inspire Party may report it immediately to Student Activities and Involvement, the Director of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution, or the University's Title IX Coordinator."

Inspire Party is in direct violation of 746.0 and Department of Student Activities and Involvement rules by adopting a constitution that differs from the guidelines set forth by the latter. Furthermore, Inspire Party's behavior is dangerous, as it puts students who are suffering from discrimination, sexual harassment, and/or hazing at risk in a difficult position by not assuring that this behavior will be reported to the appropriate authorities.

The biannual meeting of Inspire Party was held on Saturday, October 19, 2019 at 12:25 P.M., at the Marston Nye Study Room, Party Secretary Michael Hoffman being in the chair. With 18 delegates present at the call to order, quorum was set at 10 delegates.

Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed the following agenda, which was adopted by unanimous consent

- I. Adoption of agenda
- II. Brief explanation of parliamentary procedure by the chair
- III. Scheduling of adjourned meeting (i.e. Part 2 of Biannual meeting) for Sunday, October 20th in the Hume Hall classroom at 12:00 P.M., or a room elsewhere if the Hume Hall classroom is occupied.
- IV. Postponement of elections to the adjourned meeting
- V. Postponement of the Secretary's opening remarks to the adjourned meeting
- VI. Adoption of special rules of Order II and IV
- VII. Adoption of a resolution concerning the making of technical and conforming changes to the Constitution
- VIII. Constitutional amendments
 - A. A revised Constitution
 - IX. Adjourn

Secretary Michael Hoffman briefly reviewed parliamentary procedure.

Secretary Michael Hoffman moved to schedule an adjourned meeting (Part 2 of the Biannual Meeting) on Sunday, October 20th at 12:00 P.M., in the Hume Hall or elsewhere if the Hume Hall classroom is occupied

Secretary Michael Hoffman opens up debate on the motion The motion was adopted by unanimous consent

Secretary Michael Hoffman moved to postpone the election of officers and the Secretary's opening remarks to the adjourned meeting. The motion was adopted by unanimous consent.

Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed the following special rules of order

RULE II — Electronic Voting

Section 1. All absent delegates who have registered with the chair to vote remotely may do so for elections and on the final passage of constitutional amendments. Delegates who are present at the meeting but are in the remote voting GroupMe for administrative purposes must vote using the GroupMe poll.

Section 2. All absent delegates who have registered with the chair to vote remotely may view a livestream of the meeting. Any recordings of the livestream must be deleted after the meeting.

Section 3. The chair should keep electronic balloting open for two minutes, or until all registered

delegates have voted. The chair may extend time for electronic balloting.

RULE IV — Privacy

Everyone in the meeting hall must be a delegate. However, if a non-delegate has declared their intent to run for office with the Secretary and a delegate confirms they will nominate the non-delegate, then that non-delegate may only be in the meeting hall during the election of the office(s) they intend to run for.

The rules were adopted by unanimous consent

Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed the following resolution

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to correct article and section designations, punctuation, and cross-references and to make such other technical and conforming changes as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the Party in connection with the constitutional amendments passed at the fall 2019 biannual meeting.

The resolution was adopted by unanimous consent

The following revised constitution, proposed by Michael Hoffman, was adopted on a vote of 22-1 after amendments. During consideration of the revision, the meeting recessed for 10 minutes at 1:40 P.M. and for 5 minutes at 2:54 P.M. following motions by Zach Amrose

Whereas, general operation by written rules is critical to the longevity of an organization; and,

Whereas, written rules, such as the Constitution of Inspire Party, must be updated from time to time; and,

Whereas, the Constitution of Inspire Party needed a number of clarifications and minor changes; and,

Whereas, a need to create a Judicial Board to review matters related to the Inspire Party Constitution was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to further define the rights of Inspire Party members was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to develop a standard and method for proxy voting was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to develop a standard and method for passing an action outside of a regular Executive Board meeting was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to extend the responsibilities of the Secretary as to promote further compatibility between the Party Constitution and the Caucus Constitution was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to protect and extend the rights of people who wish to be delegates was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to redistribute and redefine the responsibilities of Executive Board Officers, Independent Staff, and General Staff was realized; and,

Whereas, flaws in the language and operations of the conduct arbitration process have become apparent; and,

Whereas, Michael Hoffman has drafted the following revision with assistance from Jasmin Du Bois and Zach Amrose; then,

Therefore, Let it be Resolved, that the following revision be adopted as the Constitution of Inspire Party.

CONSTITUTION OF INSPIRE PARTY

ARTICLE I --- Name

The name of this organization is Inspire Party.

ARTICLE II - Object

The object of Inspire Party is to organize students as a student political party committed to accountability, inclusivity, and transparency; to organize students as a movement committed to protecting and defending students' rights and interests; to improve the experience of University of Florida students; to make our campus and community a great place to study, work, and live; and to engage students in the civic life of our university.

ARTICLE III — Non-Discrimination, Sexual Harassment, Hazing, and Reporting

Section 1. Non-Discrimination. Inspire Party and its members agree to abstain from discriminating on the basis of race, creed, color, religion, age, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, marital status, national origin, political opinions or affiliations, genetic information, socioeconomic status, and veteran status as protected under the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act.

Section 2. Sexual Harassment. Inspire Party and its members agree to abstain from any activity that is unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature or that creates a hostile environment. Behaviors that could create a hostile environment include sexual harassment (which could include inappropriate sexual comments), sexual misconduct, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking.

Section 3. Hazing. Inspire Party and its members agree to abstain from initiating, supporting, or encouraging any events or situations that recklessly, by design, or intentionally endanger the mental or physical health or safety of a student for any purpose including but not limited to initiation or admission into or affiliation with any student group or organization.

Section 4. Responsibility to Report. If this organization becomes aware of any such conduct described in this article, Inspire Party may report it immediately to Student Activities and Involvement, the Director of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution, or the University's Title IX Coordinator.

ARTICLE IV — Membership

All students who associate with Inspire Party in good faith are members.

ARTICLE V — Code of Civility

Section 1. Standard of Conduct. Members must

- a. restrict any criticism to matters of substance,
- b. avoid personal attacks,
- c. avoid intentional disruption of another's speaking time,

d. avoid excessive or ill-timed use of profanity, especially hate speech targeted against any protected class enumerated in Article III,

e. abide by Article III of the Constitution of Inspire Party,

f. avoid behavior that would undermine the message of Inspire Party,

g. avoid superfluous criticisms,

h. avoid unfounded accusations regarding the conduct of others,

i. respect the right of others to express their opinions,

j. respect differences among Party members in their ideas and opinions,

k. only share Inspire Party's intellectual property—including strategic information and data—according to Party policy and with permission from appropriate officials,

l. not threaten, bully, blackmail, exploit, or bribe others,

m. not plagiarize, or otherwise inadequately credit, the work of other members,

n. follow the Student Body Constitution and Statutes insofar as is practicable,

o. unless the behavior is egregious, discuss concerns arising out of another member's behavior with that member before pursuing other avenues,

p. and make only thoughtful statements to the press or refer reporters to a member of the Party Executive Board.

Section 2. Reporting. Members of the Executive Board must report meaningful violations of the Code of Civility (known or suspected) to the Executive Board, the President, the Campaign Manager, the Internal Affairs Director, or the Conduct Arbitration Chair, and if the reporting party so desires, this report may be anonymous.

Section 3. Breaches of the Code of Civility. Except as restricted by the Constitution, the Executive Board reserves all powers in adjudicating and otherwise addressing breaches of the Code of Civility and ascertaining membership status.

ARTICLE VI — Elections

Section 1. Elected Officials. The President, Campaign Manager, Marketing Director, Field Director, Treasurer, Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, Policy Director, and Outreach Director must be elected and are the officers of Inspire Party.

Section 2. Time of Elections and Nomination Procedure. The regular election of all officers must occur at the biannual meeting following each general election. A person must be a delegate to be elected an officer. Nominations for each office must be made from the floor at this meeting before the election of each office. On each ballot, "reopen nominations" must be an option; if this option receives a majority, nominations reopen.

Section 3. Election Method. The officers must be elected by ballot, with balloting for each office following nominations for that office. For details on counting votes and the threshold for election, refer to the parliamentary authority. If there is only one nominee for an office, the chair may ask for unanimous consent to elect that nominee without balloting; however, the chair must wait 45 seconds for an objection before declaring the nominee elected.

Section 4. Praxy Votes. The Secretary may establish a process by which delegates may vote by proxy. Delegates may file a proxy vote for one or more elections with the Secretary as late as the day before

the election of the first officer. The proxy vote will have effect only if the delegate does not vote regularly or remotely for that office. Delegates may vote by proxy only if they are unable to vote through other means.

a. It is permissible for the Secretary to know for whom a delegate proxy voted due to the technical limitations of the proxy voting platform.

b. If after three rounds of balloting for an office there is no election, the proxy votes will be disregarded in the fourth round.

c. The minutes must note the names of delegates who cast proxy votes for an office.

d. Standing rules may require delegates to cast proxy votes at a particular time, date, and location and in a particular manner.

Section 5. Special Rules of Order. Each biannual meeting and special election meeting should adopt special rules of order delineating a process occurring between nominations and balloting by which the Party may learn about and discuss the nominees for an office. Each biannual meeting and special election meeting may adopt special rules of order allowing delegates not present at the meeting to vote remotely in elections; secure electronic balloting must be used for remote voting for office and may also be used for local voting. It is permissible for remote delegates to be unable to cast write-in votes due to the technical limitations of the secure electronic balloting platform.

Section 6. Terms and Oath of Office. The officers may serve until their successors are elected at the following biannual meeting. After taking office, an officer must recite the following oath. " I, _____, do solemnly affirm that I will execute the office of _____, as the membership has entrusted to me through the Constitution of Inspire Party, to serve the Student Body of the University of Florida."

Section 7. Removal from Office. The Executive Board may remove an officer with a motion at a meeting, which all members of the Executive Board and officers are entitled to vote on. A majority of all who may vote on the motion must assent to it for the officer to be removed; as stated in § 8 and clarified here, acting officers may not vote on this motion. All who may vote on the motion to remove an officer

a. must be notified of the vote at least 24 hours before it takes place,

b. and may, if the Executive Board meeting is electronic, still participate remotely or in-person. A removal may be reversed by the submission of a petition signed, electronically or physically, by two-thirds of the Caucus within three days of the removal vote. Reasons for removal include nonfeasance, misfeasance, malfeasance, or serious breaches of the Code of Civility.

Section 8. Resignation and Vacancies. Any officer desiring to resign from office may submit their resignation to the Executive Board for action. Whenever a vacancy arises in any of the aforementioned offices, the President may fill it with an acting officer who may serve until the Executive Board chooses a permanent replacement or until the day of a special election meeting called to fill the vacancy. Acting officers whose offices are on the Executive Board may not vote on Executive Board business but are otherwise entitled to the full privileges of membership.

ARTICLE VII — Duties of Elected Executive Board Members

Section 1. President. The President must

- a. faithfully execute the decisions of the Executive Board,
- b. attempt to strategically advance the Party in accordance with all legal and ethical constraints,
- c. serve as the spokesperson and external point of contact of the Party,
- d. monitor, work to maintain, and work to improve the morale of the membership, especially among those members belonging to underrepresented communities,

e. manage the public relations of the Party,

f. compile the minutes of all Executive Board meetings at the end of each campaign,

g. fulfill duties pursuant to their status as an official representative of the Party under Student Government election law,

h. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 2. Campaign Manager. The Campaign Manager must

a. be subordinate to the President in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. report to the President on the execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

c. execute any enumerated or implied responsibilities of the President at the pleasure of the President,

d. manage candidates,

e. execute internal administrative functions,

f. manage debate and forum efforts of the Party,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 3. Marketing Director. The Marketing Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage outreach through social media,

c. manage the design of graphics and campaign materials,

d. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 4. Field Director. The Field Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage volunteers,

- c. manage the collection of policy suggestions from direct student contact,
- d. manage canvassing, tabling, flyering, and like efforts of the Party,
- e. manage field operation participants,
- f. manage data collection and analysis,

g. manage get out the vote efforts,

h. manage the acquisition and distribution of all physical campaign materials of the Party,

i. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 5. Treasurer. The Treasurer must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

manage the collection of donations and financial contributions to the Party,

c. manage the expenditures of the Party on campaign materials,

d. maintain accurate records of said donations, contributions, and expenditures,

e. manage the reporting of all records to relevant campaign officials,

j. fulfill duties pursuant to their status as an official representative of the Party under Student Government election law,

k. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 6. Policy Director. The Policy Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. assist in the collection of policy suggestions through direct student contact,

c. manage the development of a comprehensive Party platform,

d. assist the Caucus Legislative Director,

e. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 7. Outreach Director. The Outreach Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage general body meetings (which are not meetings in the parliamentary sense),

c. manage outreach to relevant outside entities,

d. maintain a contact sheet for relevant outside entities,

e. share resources with the Caucus Outreach Director,

f. actively promote and maintain Inspire Party's long-term relationships with outside entities,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

ARTICLE VIII — General Staff

Section 1. The President must appoint General Staff to assist in the faithful execution of decisions of the Executive Board. The President must organize staff as subordinates in principal teams led by members of the Executive Board, or as direct subordinates of any Independent Staff.

Section 2. The President must consult with relevant Independent Staff and all members of the

Executive Board before appointing General Staff.

ARTICLE IX — Independent Staff

Section 1. The Executive Board must appoint the following Independent Staff, with the exception of the elected Internal Affairs Director and Conduct Arbitration Chair, to assist in the faithful execution of decisions of the Executive Board. Independent Staff are subordinate only to the Executive Board and must deliver a report to the Executive Board once a month.

Section 2. Secretary. The Secretary must

a. record the minutes from the meetings of the Executive Board upon request of the Executive Board,

b. provide non-binding interpretation of the Constitution of Inspire Party upon request,

c. maintain an archive of old copies of the Constitution,

d. pursue compatibility between the Constitution of Inspire Party and the Constitution of the Inspire Senate Caucus,

e. be knowledgeable about the parliamentary authority,

f. prepare an agenda for biannual meetings and special election meetings,

g. chair biannual meetings and special election meetings,

h. establish a means for delegates to determine who is planning to run for which offices,

i. notify delegates of biannual meetings and special election meetings,

j. propose special rules of order for each biannual meeting and special election meeting,

k. verify the legitimacy of petitions submitted by members before they come into effect,

1. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 3. Party Counsel. The Party Counsel must

a. manage any litigation involving the Party and its members as it relates to the Party at the discretion of the Executive Board,

b. represent the Party before the Elections Commission and Supreme Court,

c. provide legal advice as requested by any member of the Executive Board as relevant to the Party,

d. ensure that the Party abides by all applicable laws and Student Body statutes,

e. file election code violations with all deliberate speed,

f. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 4. Historian. The Historian must

a. maintain a sustainability plan for the Party,

b. compile the minutes of all special committees for conduct arbitration, biannual meetings, special election meetings, and constitutional amendment meetings,

c. keep a record of all notable events throughout the course of a campaign and between campaigns,

d. compile all articles relevant to the campaign and Inspire Party members,

e. compile notable photographs and other media relevant to the campaign,

f. keep a record of any other information which may benefit future Party members or leadership,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 5. Internal Affairs Director. The Internal Affairs Director must

a. manage an anonymous survey through which members may report issues related to the Party,

b. act as the official, independent first point of contact and good-faith intermediary for resolving such issues,

c. notify the Executive Board of conflicts of interest, potential or realized,

d. attend meetings of the Executive Board as they, the Internal Affairs Director, or the Executive Board deem necessary, except when the Executive Board is in executive session,

e. be given at least 3 minutes of speaking time at the beginning of Executive Board meetings by the Executive Board, but not speak unless otherwise allowed,

f. propose to the Executive Board a remedy for any issue brought to the attention of the Internal Affairs Director, at the discretion of the Internal Affairs Director,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 6. Conduct Arbitration Chair. The Conduct Arbitration Chair must

a. propose special rules of order for each special committee for conduct arbitration that ensure due process according to the preponderance of evidence standard,

b. appoint default counsel for the claimant and respondent, but assist claimants and respondents in choosing different counsel if they desire,

c. educate members about the conduct arbitration process,

d. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party (particularly Article XII) and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

ARTICLE X — Meetings

Section 1. Delegates. Delegates, and only delegates, act on behalf of the membership at biannual meetings and special election meetings; through these meetings, delegates are the highest authority in the Party. After a general election and consultation with relevant Party officials, the Executive Board must propose a list of delegates to the Caucus. The proposed delegates on this list must

a. be Inspire-affiliated Student Government officials,

b. have been candidates for elected Student Government office with the Party in the last election,

c. be Party officers,

d. be Party staff persons,

e. or be people who canvassed five or more hours for the Party for the last campaign.

The Caucus must then approve all delegates on the list who meet the above qualifications. Before approving the list of delegates, the Caucus may add delegates to the list who meet the above

qualifications.

The Party Executive Board and Caucus may also submit to the other body additional delegates for approval, either upon their own initiative or a member's petition. Additionally, the Party Executive Board and Caucus may only grant or revoke delegate status for a biannual meeting with the approval of the other body and before the day of the biannual meeting. In adding and removing delegates, the Caucus Executive Board may act for the Caucus, but the Caucus may override the Caucus Executive Board's decision.

Section 2. Opening Statement. Following the setting of quorum at biannual meetings and special election meetings, the Secretary must give a statement. The statement should cover

a. the importance of electing officers who can work as respectful team members,

b. the importance of electing officers who can be trusted to maintain confidentiality,

c. and the importance of electing officers who can provide the Party with a diversity of thought and experience.

The Secretary must also call for delegates to consider that they may have been closer to certain staff by virtue of their position during the campaign, and that delegates should consider their personal biases when voting for officers. Delegates must also be warned about the burden of holding more than one Executive Board position.

Section 3. Biannual Meetings. The biannual meetings of the Party must be held within six weeks of the Elections Commission's consideration of validating the previous general or run-off election, whichever comes first. The only business that may be transacted at these meetings is the election of officers and the amendment of the Constitution of Inspire Party. By default, only delegates may attend or otherwise witness the biannual meeting, but in advance of the biannual meeting the Executive Board may allow specifically enumerated alumni to attend.

Section 4. Special Meetings. The Executive Board must schedule a special meeting upon submission of a petition specifying the items of discussion for the special meeting signed, electronically or physically, by one-third of the Caucus (or 20 such persons, whichever is less), or by one-third of the combined Executive Board, Independent Staff, and General Staff (or 20 such persons, whichever is less). The Executive Board must decide who may attend a special meeting. The plenary power of the Executive Board over the affairs of the Party must be respected.

Section 5. Special Election Meetings. When one or more elected offices become vacant, the Executive Board may schedule special election meetings to fill one or more of the vacancies. Delegates to the previous biannual meeting, and only those delegates, are delegates to a special election meeting. By default, only delegates may attend or otherwise witness a special election meeting, but in advance of a special election meeting the Executive Board may allow specifically enumerated alumni to attend.

Section 6. Quorum and Notice. A majority of the number of delegates present at the beginning of a biannual meeting constitutes a quorum for that biannual meeting. Delegates must be notified of the biannual meeting at least one week in advance. A majority of the number of delegates present at the beginning of a special election meeting constitutes a quorum for that special election meeting.

Delegates must be notified of a special election meeting at least one week in advance.

ARTICLE XI — The Executive Board

Section 1. Board Composition. The President, Campaign Manager, Marketing Director, Field Director, Treasurer, Policy Director, Outreach Director, and the Caucus Leader constitute the Executive Board.

Section 2. Board's Powers and Duties. The Executive Board has plenary power over the affairs of the Party, with the exception that special committees for conduct arbitration and the Judicial Board are not subject to this plenary power.

However, the Executive Board may adopt standing rules to generally govern the conduct arbitration process; a special committee for conduct arbitration must obey the standing rules as they were when the earliest petition the special committee is hearing was filed.

Additionally, the Executive Board may overturn any decision or action of the Judicial Board by a two-thirds vote provided prior notice is given, but must otherwise accommodate judicial review. The Executive Board must

a. arrange the date, time, and place of meetings,

b. invite the Caucus Executive Board to its meetings from time to time to foster cooperation and goodwill,

c. adopt standing rules for the Party regarding control of Party accounts (such as social media accounts), data (such as the voter file), and intellectual property (such as graphics members of the Marketing Team create),

d. and include in those standing rules policies that mitigate the risk of one or more people seizing control of Party accounts, data, or intellectual property against the will of the Party.

Section 3. Board Meetings. The Executive Board must regularly meet, either upon the call of the President or two members of the Executive Board. The Executive Board may waive the recording of minutes only by the unanimous consent of all members. Electronic Executive Board meetings—those with all or some participants not in the same room—may be held only using technology that enables simultaneous aural communication if and only if the Executive Board has adopted special rules of order addressing the unique needs of electronic meetings.

Section 4. Action Without Meeting. The Executive Board may adopt a motion agreed to by two-thirds of the membership of the Executive Board without meeting, provided the motion does not rescind, amend, or adopt a standing rule.

Section 5. The Executive Board may create standing committees and boards with standing authority, as explicitly granted by the Executive Board, to act on specific matters without specific instructions.

Section 6. Co-officers. If the workload of the campaign demands it, the Executive Board may grant an office on the Executive Board (except the office of President) "co-officer status" by a two-thirds vote, provided that prior notice is given. This creates a second, equal seat for the office.

a. After an office is granted co-officer status, if one person already holds the office, then there is one vacancy in the office; this vacancy may be filled (with a permanent or acting replacement) with the usual methods. After an office is granted co-officer status, if no one holds the office, then there are two vacancies in the office; each may be filled (each with permanent or acting replacements) with the usual methods.

b. In lieu of a decision of the Executive Board, the President or their designee will settle all administrative disputes regarding co-officers.

c. Each co-officer is a member of the Executive Board.

d. If the Executive Board rescinds co-officer status, only the person who held the office before the office was granted co-officer status will retain the office. However, if the Executive Board granted the office co-officer status when the office was vacant, then the Executive Board must specify in its motion to rescind co-officer status which co-officer is to retain the office. Regardless of whether the Executive Board rescinds co-officer status, at the following biannual meeting only one person will be elected to any office, and once that person is elected to office, co-officer status expires.

Section 7. Quorum and Notice. A majority of the membership of the Executive Board constitutes a quorum. Members of the Executive Board must be notified of an Executive Board meeting at least 24 hours before it takes place, although this may be waived through the consent of all members unable or unwilling to attend the meeting.

ARTICLE XII — Special Committees for Conduct Arbitration

Section 1. Initiation. Any member may submit a petition—anonymously, if they prefer—to the Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, or Executive Board accusing an officer, Inspire-affiliated Student Government official, Independent Staff person, General Staff person, or volunteer of nonfeasance, misfeasance, malfeasance, or serious breaches of the Code of Civility. When the Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, or Executive Board receives such a petition, they must share it with the other two bodies or officers, respecting the will of some parties to remain anonymous.

If either the Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, or Executive Board deems the petition plausible, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must refer it to a special committee for conduct arbitration. The Conduct Arbitration Chair must decide which petitions a special committee will hear; the same special committee should hear related petitions.

Section 2. Appointment. The Conduct Arbitration Chair will initiate the following appointment process when a special committee for conduct arbitration is needed to hear one or more petitions. The Conduct Arbitration Chair must inform the Party Executive Board and Caucus Executive Board of the content of the petitions, respecting the will of some parties to remain anonymous.

a. The Conduct Arbitration Chair will request that the Party Executive Board appoint two people—each of whom must be a member of the Caucus or a senator-elect at the time of appointment—to the special committee. This appointment is valid once the Caucus Executive Board confirms it.

b. The Conduct Arbitration Chair will also request that the Caucus Executive Board appoint one person—who is neither a member of the Caucus, a senator-elect, nor a senate candidate at the time of appointment—to the special committee. This appointment is valid once the Party Executive Board confirms it.

c. After both appointments are confirmed, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must accept both of the appointments, and thus form the special committee, if they would result in a special committee with no more than two members self-identifying with a particular gender; otherwise, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must reject the appointments. Neither Executive Board may rescind or amend its appointments after the Conduct Arbitration Chair accepts them without the consent of the other Executive Board. The Conduct Arbitration Chair is a member and the chair of all special committees for conduct arbitration.

Section 3. Time Limits. If 60 hours have passed since the Conduct Arbitration Chair's request for appointments has been served and that special committee for conduct arbitration has not yet formed because one or both of the appointments were not made, one or both of the appointments were not confirmed, or the Conduct Arbitration Chair rejected one or both of the appointments, the Conduct Arbitration Chair may allow

a. the Party Executive Board to appoint a member of the special committee on the Caucus Executive Board's behalf, without the need for confirmation,

b. and/or the Caucus Executive Board to appoint members of the special committee on the Party Executive Board's behalf, without the need for confirmation.

Section 4. Conduct, Resignation, and Vacancies. Members of a special committee for conduct arbitration other than the Conduct Arbitration Chair must avoid learning of the details of the petition(s) in advance. Any member of a special committee may submit their resignation to the Conduct Arbitration Chair for action. The Conduct Arbitration Chair may fill vacancies in a special committee if both Executive Boards cannot agree on a replacement member within 24 hours after the Chair accepts the resignation.

In the event the petition directly states the Conduct Arbitration Chair as a respondent or claimant, the Judicial Board will determine whether the Conduct Arbitration Chair is fit to handle that petition. If the Conduct Arbitration Chair is determined unfit, the Judicial Board will appoint either the Internal Affairs Director or Chair of the Judicial Board to serve as Conduct Arbitration Chair for that petition in all further respects.

Section 5. Notice and Quorum. After a special committee for conduct arbitration is formed and the Conduct Arbitration Chair has referred one or more petitions to it, the Conduct Arbitration Chair will call a meeting of the special committee. Before calling the meeting, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must tell the filers of the petition (the claimants) and those the petition accuses (the respondents) that the Chair intends to call the meeting and give them, the claimants and respondents, 24 hours to communicate their availability.

The claimants, respondents, counsel, the Caucus Executive Board, the Party Executive Board, and members of the special committee must be notified of the meeting and the proposed special rules of order at least four days in advance. Three-quarters of the membership of a special committee for arbitration constitutes a quorum. Section 6. Process. At the meeting, the special committee for conduct arbitration will hear the petitions referred to it and may rule on them. The claimants and respondents may appoint counsel to represent them during the meeting.

a. The meeting must begin with only the special committee members, claimants, respondents, and counsel in the meeting hall. First, each special committee must adopt special rules of order that ensure due process according to the preponderance of evidence standard. Claimants and respondents, or their counsel, may comment on the proposed special rules of order and propose amendments before their adoption.

b. Then, the special committee must decide—in consultation with the claimants, respondents, and their counsel—what evidence and testimony may be considered and whether it may be considered in the presence of other members. The Chair may strike evidence from the special committee's consideration, but the special committee may reverse any such determination.

c. Upon the protest of the claimants or respondents regarding some evidence or testimony, the special committee must be unanimous in its decision to allow that evidence or testimony to be considered in the presence of other members.

d. Only after the adoption of special rules of order and the aforementioned evidence and testimony decisions may the special committee allow members who are not the claimants, respondents, or their counsel into the meeting hall; the special committee may receive comments from these members during a hearing portion of the meeting. But a special committee that meets without ever allowing members into the meeting hall must make this meeting known to the Party.

e. The special committee must respect the will of all involved parties who wish to remain anonymous and the need for some evidence (including testimony) to remain confidential. The special committee for conduct arbitration must consider circumstances such as cooperation (or lack thereof) with the committee's investigation(s) when ruling.

Section 7. Powers. Members of a special committee for conduct arbitration, as well as the Internal Affairs Director, may subpoen a witnesses and evidence for the meeting. All Party members must comply with subpoenas. A special committee for conduct arbitration may, in its ruling,

a. require a respondent publicly apologize to members of the Party,

b. recommend a respondent face some other remedy, such as removal from office or having their appointment rescinded,

c. or recommend a respondent face some other remedy, such as removal from office or having their appointment rescinded, if their conduct remains poor.

Section 8. Continuation and Dissolution. If a special committee for conduct arbitration adjourns a meeting without having completed its work, the Conduct Arbitration Chair will call the next meeting of the special committee, giving notice to those involved in the proceedings. A special committee must dissolve itself after hearing all petitions referred to it.

ARTICLE XIII — The Judicial Board

Section 1. Board Composition. The Independent Staff who are not members of the Executive Board constitute the Judicial Board. The Judicial Board must elect a Chair of the Judicial Board from among its membership.

Section 2. Board's Powers and Duties. The Judicial Board may rule on whether an act of the Party violated the Constitution or a standing rule. The Board may also rule on whether a standing rule violates the Constitution. Rulings of the Board are binding upon all Party members and officials and may include injunctive relief. The Board has general subpoena power over the Party.

Section 3. Board Meetings. The Judicial Board will meet upon the call of the Chair or two members.

Section 4. Process. Upon receiving a petition from a member identifying a violation, the Chair of the Judicial Board will share it with the other Board members.

a. If two members of the Board find the petition worthy of the Board's consideration, the Chair must schedule a meeting of the Judicial Board to rule on the petition.

b. As appropriate, the Board will find the Constitution of the Inspire Senate Caucus persuasive in its rulings.

c. The Board must write an opinion after ruling and deliver it to the Executive Board, and only the Executive Board.

Section 5. Notice, Quorum, and Rules. Board members must have 24 hours' notice before a meeting. A majority of the membership of the Board constitutes a quorum. The Board must adopt rules to govern the judicial review process.

ARTICLE XIV — Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised must govern the Party in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of Inspire Party and any special rules of order the Party may adopt.

ARTICLE XV — Amendment of Constitution

Section 1. The Constitution of Inspire Party may be amended by a two-thirds vote at the biannual meeting, provided that prior notice is given. Each biannual meeting may adopt special rules of order allowing delegates not present at the meeting to vote remotely on the final passage of constitutional amendments; secure electronic balloting must be used for remote voting on the final passage of constitutional amendments and may also be used for local voting.

Section 2. The Constitution of Inspire Party may be amended by a two-thirds vote at a constitutional amendment meeting called by the Executive Board or Caucus, provided that prior notice is given. For the purposes of a constitutional amendment meeting, the combined Independent Staff and voting membership of the Executive Board constitutes the membership, a majority of the membership constitutes a quorum, and the Secretary must serve as chair. General Staff and members of the Caucus may speak at constitutional amendment meetings.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:54 P.M.

The adjourned meeting of the biannual meeting of Inspire Party took place on Sunday, October 20th, 2019 at 12:27 P.M., at the Hume Classroom, Secretary Michael Hoffman being in the chair.

The minutes from the regular biannual meeting was approved as read.

Party Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed special rules of order. They were adopted as follows after amendment.

RULE I - Election Presentation, Questioning, and Debate

Section 1. Following nominations, each nominee will have seven minutes to present (with visual aids at the discretion of the chair) and then four minutes to answer questions. The chair will call on delegates to ask questions. No individual may present and answer questions for more than two offices. For the offices of President and Campaign Manager, each nominee will have nine minutes to present and and five to answer questions. Section 2. Debate. Following the conclusion of presentations and questioning for all nominees, the Party will debate each nominee in the same order presentations were made. In the debate on each nominee, no delegate may give a speech longer than two minutes and no delegate may speak more than twice with regard to a nominee.

Section 3. Closing Statements. Following debate, each nominee will have three minutes to make a closing statement (with visual aids at the discretion of the chair) and answer questions. The chair will call on delegates to ask questions. The order of closing statements will be opposite the order that presentations were made in. For the offices of President and Campaign Manager, closing statements will last four minutes.

Section 4. This procedure need not occur again if the Party chooses to reopen and close nominations, unless the Party decides otherwise.

RULE II — Electronic Voting

Section 1. All absent delegates who have registered with the chair to vote remotely may do so for elections and on the final passage of constitutional amendments. Delegates who are present at the meeting but are in the remote voting GroupMe for administrative purposes must vote using the GroupMe poll.

Section 2. All absent delegates who have registered with the chair to vote remotely may view a livestream of the meeting. Any recordings of the livestream must be deleted after the meeting.

Section 3. The chair should keep electronic balloting open for two minutes, or until all registered delegates have voted. The chair may extend time for electronic balloting.

RULE III — Remote Running for Office

Nominees may designate to the Party Secretary a proxy to exercise Rule I on their behalf. Alternatively, nominees may give a presentation, answer questions, and make a closing statement through video or audio conferencing software if they inform the Party Secretary in advance.

RULE IV — Privacy

Everyone in the meeting hall must be a delegate. However, if a non-delegate has declared their intent to run for office with the Secretary and a delegate confirms they will nominate the non-delegate, then that non-delegate may only be in the meeting hall during the election of the office(s) they intend to run for.

RULE V — Protected Identities

If a delegate believes a question/statement of theirs in questioning or debate would reveal themselves to be a member of a community they would not like to be revealed a part of, that delegate may message their question/statement to the Internal Affairs Director, or the Director's designee. The Internal Affairs Director, if they are reasonably sure that delegate fits the criteria for this procedure, will then ask/make the question/statement on the delegate's behalf. Such statements will not count against the Internal Affairs Director's speaking limit.

Secretary Michael Hoffman asked if there was any objection to "forming a committee consisting of Michael Hoffman, Isabella Garcia, and Lindsay Spruce to approve the minutes from this meeting." The motion was adopted by unanimous consent.

Secretary Michael Hoffman delivered opening remarks.

The rules were suspended to "elect the Field Director."

Patrick Lewicki and Spencer Gorelick were nominated as candidates for Field Director

The first round of balloting for Field Director yielded the following results: Number of votes cast - 45 Necessary for election (majority) - 23 Reopen Nominations - 1 Spencer Gorelick - 43 Patrick Lewicki - 2 Spencer Gorelick was elected Field Director.

Matthew Barocas was nominated as candidate for Treasurer. Matthew Barocas was elected Treasurer by unanimous consent.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 4:30 P.M.

Claudia Tio Elections Violation Complaint #1

On October 19, 2019 and October 20, 2019, at approximately 12:25 PM and 12:27 PM, respectively, Inspire Party held a secret meeting in which a constitution was adopted and Executive Board officers elected. This meeting took place after the Fall campaign cycle had concluded and before the Spring election cycle had begun.

The minutes from this meeting are attached and serve as proof that Inspire Party operated outside of campaign cycles, violating § 761.1, which states that "Campaign Activities begin on the first day of the active election cycle and ends immediately after the close of polls on the final day of elections." 700.4(e) states that "Campaign Activity" will be interpreted as interchangeable with "Campaigning" and will be interpreted as having the full meaning ascribed in § 700.4(d) as per 2013-SC: Students Party v. Swamp Party decision." In turn, § 700.4(d) states that "Campaigning" means any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office, including, but not limited to the distribution of literature and posting of election specific materials. "Campaigning" does not include maintaining a website excluded to providing general information about the party and party members, or wearing campaign material, as defined in 700.4(f), a campaign shirt, a button, an emblem or similar paraphernalia, unless accompanied by the dissemination of campaign literature or the delivery of a campaign speech to solicit support for a candidate or political party." By attending this meeting, adopting a Party constitution, and electing Executive Board officers, the attendees of this meeting, which constitute the membership of Inspire Party, campaigned, as they expressed support for Inspire Party, which is currently running candidates for Student Government office, and laid the groundwork for the Spring campaign long before the official campaign season had begun. This presented not only a violation of the codes, but an unfair advantage over other parties and candidates, as Inspire Party operated outside of campaign season and thus had undue time to prepare.

The rules were adopted by unanimous consent

Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed the following resolution

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to correct article and section designations, punctuation, and cross-references and to make such other technical and conforming changes as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the Party in connection with the constitutional amendments passed at the fall 2019 biannual meeting.

The resolution was adopted by unanimous consent

The following revised constitution, proposed by Michael Hoffman, was adopted on a vote of 22-1 after amendments. During consideration of the revision, the meeting recessed for 10 minutes at 1:40 P.M. and for 5 minutes at 2:54 P.M. following motions by Zach Amrose

Whereas, general operation by written rules is critical to the longevity of an organization; and,

Whereas, written rules, such as the Constitution of Inspire Party, must be updated from time to time; and,

Whereas, the Constitution of Inspire Party needed a number of clarifications and minor changes; and,

Whereas, a need to create a Judicial Board to review matters related to the Inspire Party Constitution was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to further define the rights of Inspire Party members was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to develop a standard and method for proxy voting was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to develop a standard and method for passing an action outside of a regular Executive Board meeting was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to extend the responsibilities of the Secretary as to promote further compatibility between the Party Constitution and the Caucus Constitution was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to protect and extend the rights of people who wish to be delegates was realized; and,

Whereas, a need to redistribute and redefine the responsibilities of Executive Board Officers, Independent Staff, and General Staff was realized; and,

Whereas, flaws in the language and operations of the conduct arbitration process have become apparent; and,

Whereas, Michael Hoffman has drafted the following revision with assistance from Jasmin Du Bois and Zach Amrose; then,

Therefore, Let it be Resolved, that the following revision be adopted as the Constitution of Inspire Party.

CONSTITUTION OF INSPIRE PARTY

ARTICLE I — Name

The name of this organization is Inspire Party.

ARTICLE II - Object

The object of Inspire Party is to organize students as a student political party committed to accountability, inclusivity, and transparency; to organize students as a movement committed to protecting and defending students' rights and interests; to improve the experience of University of Florida students; to make our campus and community a great place to study, work, and live; and to engage students in the civic life of our university.

ARTICLE III - Non-Discrimination, Sexual Harassment, Hazing, and Reporting

Section 1. Non-Discrimination. Inspire Party and its members agree to abstain from discriminating on the basis of race, creed, color, religion, age, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, marital status, national origin, political opinions or affiliations, genetic information, socioeconomic status, and veteran status as protected under the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act.

Section 2. Sexual Harassment. Inspire Party and its members agree to abstain from any activity that is unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature or that creates a hostile environment. Behaviors that could create a hostile environment include sexual harassment (which could include inappropriate sexual comments), sexual misconduct, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking.

Section 3. Hazing. Inspire Party and its members agree to abstain from initiating, supporting, or encouraging any events or situations that recklessly, by design, or intentionally endanger the mental or physical health or safety of a student for any purpose including but not limited to initiation or admission into or affiliation with any student group or organization.

Section 4. Responsibility to Report. If this organization becomes aware of any such conduct described in this article, Inspire Party may report it immediately to Student Activities and Involvement, the Director of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution, or the University's Title IX Coordinator.

ARTICLE IV — Membership

All students who associate with Inspire Party in good faith are members.

ARTICLE V --- Code of Civility

Section 1. Standard of Conduct. Members must

- a. restrict any criticism to matters of substance,
- b. avoid personal attacks,

c. avoid intentional disruption of another's speaking time,

d. avoid excessive or ill-timed use of profanity, especially hate speech targeted against any protected class enumerated in Article III,

e. abide by Article III of the Constitution of Inspire Party,

- f. avoid behavior that would undermine the message of Inspire Party,
- g. avoid superfluous criticisms,
- h. avoid unfounded accusations regarding the conduct of others,
- i. respect the right of others to express their opinions,
- j. respect differences among Party members in their ideas and opinions,
- k. only share Inspire Party's intellectual property-including strategic information and data-according to Party policy and with permission from appropriate officials,
- 1. not threaten, bully, blackmail, exploit, or bribe others,
- m. not plagiarize, or otherwise inadequately credit, the work of other members,
- n. follow the Student Body Constitution and Statutes insofar as is practicable,

o. unless the behavior is egregious, discuss concerns arising out of another member's behavior with that member before pursuing other avenues,

p. and make only thoughtful statements to the press or refer reporters to a member of the Party Executive Board.

Section 2. Reporting. Members of the Executive Board must report meaningful violations of the Code of Civility (known or suspected) to the Executive Board, the President, the Campaign Manager, the Internal Affairs Director, or the Conduct Arbitration Chair, and if the reporting party so desires, this report may be anonymous.

Section 3. Breaches of the Code of Civility. Except as restricted by the Constitution, the Executive Board reserves all powers in adjudicating and otherwise addressing breaches of the Code of Civility and ascertaining membership status.

ARTICLE VI — Elections

Section 1. Elected Officials. The President, Campaign Manager, Marketing Director, Field Director, Treasurer, Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, Policy Director, and Outreach Director must be elected and are the officers of Inspire Party.

Section 2. Time of Elections and Nomination Procedure. The regular election of all officers must occur at the biannual meeting following each general election. A person must be a delegate to be elected an officer. Nominations for each office must be made from the floor at this meeting before the election of each office. On each ballot, "reopen nominations" must be an option; if this option receives a majority, nominations reopen.

Section 3. Election Method. The officers must be elected by ballot, with balloting for each office following nominations for that office. For details on counting votes and the threshold for election, refer to the parliamentary authority. If there is only one nominee for an office, the chair may ask for unanimous consent to elect that nominee without balloting; however, the chair must wait 45 seconds for an objection before declaring the nominee elected.

Section 4. Proxy Votes. The Secretary may establish a process by which delegates may vote by proxy. Delegates may file a proxy vote for one or more elections with the Secretary as late as the day before

the election of the first officer. The proxy vote will have effect only if the delegate does not vote regularly or remotely for that office. Delegates may vote by proxy only if they are unable to vote through other means.

a. It is permissible for the Secretary to know for whom a delegate proxy voted due to the technical limitations of the proxy voting platform.

b. If after three rounds of balloting for an office there is no election, the proxy votes will be disregarded in the fourth round.

c. The minutes must note the names of delegates who cast proxy votes for an office.

d. Standing rules may require delegates to cast proxy votes at a particular time, date, and location and in a particular manner.

Section 5. Special Rules of Order. Each biannual meeting and special election meeting should adopt special rules of order delineating a process occurring between nominations and balloting by which the Party may learn about and discuss the nominees for an office. Each biannual meeting and special election meeting may adopt special rules of order allowing delegates not present at the meeting to vote remotely in elections; secure electronic balloting must be used for remote voting for office and may also be used for local voting. It is permissible for remote delegates to be unable to cast write-in votes due to the technical limitations of the secure electronic balloting platform.

Section 6. Terms and Oath of Office. The officers may serve until their successors are elected at the following biannual meeting. After taking office, an officer must recite the following oath. "I, _____, do solemnly affirm that I will execute the office of ______, as the membership has entrusted to me through the Constitution of Inspire Party, to serve the Student Body of the University of Florida."

Section 7. Removal from Office. The Executive Board may remove an officer with a motion at a meeting, which all members of the Executive Board and officers are entitled to vote on. A majority of all who may vote on the motion must assent to it for the officer to be removed; as stated in § 8 and clarified here, acting officers may not vote on this motion. All who may vote on the motion to remove an officer

a. must be notified of the vote at least 24 hours before it takes place,

b. and may, if the Executive Board meeting is electronic, still participate remotely or in-person. A removal may be reversed by the submission of a petition signed, electronically or physically, by two-thirds of the Caucus within three days of the removal vote. Reasons for removal include nonfeasance, misfeasance, malfeasance, or serious breaches of the Code of Civility.

Section 8. Resignation and Vacancies. Any officer desiring to resign from office may submit their resignation to the Executive Board for action. Whenever a vacancy arises in any of the aforementioned offices, the President may fill it with an acting officer who may serve until the Executive Board chooses a permanent replacement or until the day of a special election meeting called to fill the vacancy. Acting officers whose offices are on the Executive Board may not vote on Executive Board business but are otherwise entitled to the full privileges of membership.

ARTICLE VII — Duties of Elected Executive Board Members

Section 1. President. The President must

a. faithfully execute the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. attempt to strategically advance the Party in accordance with all legal and ethical constraints,

c. serve as the spokesperson and external point of contact of the Party,

d. monitor, work to maintain, and work to improve the morale of the membership, especially among those members belonging to underrepresented communities,

e. manage the public relations of the Party,

f. compile the minutes of all Executive Board meetings at the end of each campaign,

g. fulfill duties pursuant to their status as an official representative of the Party under Student Government election law,

h. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 2. Campaign Manager. The Campaign Manager must

a. be subordinate to the President in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. report to the President on the execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

c. execute any enumerated or implied responsibilities of the President at the pleasure of the President,

d. manage candidates,

e. execute internal administrative functions,

f. manage debate and forum efforts of the Party,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 3. Marketing Director. The Marketing Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage outreach through social media,

c. manage the design of graphics and campaign materials,

d. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 4. Field Director. The Field Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage volunteers,

c. manage the collection of policy suggestions from direct student contact,

d. manage canvassing, tabling, flyering, and like efforts of the Party,

e. manage field operation participants,

f. manage data collection and analysis,

g. manage get out the vote efforts,

h. manage the acquisition and distribution of all physical campaign materials of the Party,

i. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 5. Treasurer. The Treasurer must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage the collection of donations and financial contributions to the Party,

c. manage the expenditures of the Party on campaign materials,

d. maintain accurate records of said donations, contributions, and expenditures,

e. manage the reporting of all records to relevant campaign officials,

j. fulfill duties pursuant to their status as an official representative of the Party under Student Government election law,

k. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 6. Policy Director. The Policy Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. assist in the collection of policy suggestions through direct student contact,

c. manage the development of a comprehensive Party platform,

d. assist the Caucus Legislative Director,

e. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 7. Outreach Director. The Outreach Director must

a. be subordinate to the Campaign Manager in the faithful execution of the decisions of the Executive Board,

b. manage general body meetings (which are not meetings in the parliamentary sense),

c. manage outreach to relevant outside entities,

d. maintain a contact sheet for relevant outside entities,

e. share resources with the Caucus Outreach Director,

f. actively promote and maintain Inspire Party's long-term relationships with outside entities,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

ARTICLE VIII — General Staff

Section 1. The President must appoint General Staff to assist in the faithful execution of decisions of the Executive Board. The President must organize staff as subordinates in principal teams led by members of the Executive Board, or as direct subordinates of any Independent Staff.

Section 2. The President must consult with relevant Independent Staff and all members of the

Executive Board before appointing General Staff.

ARTICLE IX - Independent Staff

Section 1. The Executive Board must appoint the following Independent Staff, with the exception of the elected Internal Affairs Director and Conduct Arbitration Chair, to assist in the faithful execution of decisions of the Executive Board. Independent Staff are subordinate only to the Executive Board and must deliver a report to the Executive Board once a month.

Section 2. Secretary. The Secretary must

record the minutes from the meetings of the Executive Board upon request of the Executive a. Board,

provide non-binding interpretation of the Constitution of Inspire Party upon request, b.

maintain an archive of old copies of the Constitution, с.

pursue compatibility between the Constitution of Inspire Party and the Constitution of the d. Inspire Senate Caucus,

be knowledgeable about the parliamentary authority, e.

f. prepare an agenda for biannual meetings and special election meetings,

g. chair biannual meetings and special election meetings,

h. establish a means for delegates to determine who is planning to run for which offices,

notify delegates of biannual meetings and special election meetings, i.

propose special rules of order for each biannual meeting and special election meeting, j.

k. verify the legitimacy of petitions submitted by members before they come into effect,

I. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 3. Party Counsel. The Party Counsel must

manage any litigation involving the Party and its members as it relates to the Party at the **a**. discretion of the Executive Board,

represent the Party before the Elections Commission and Supreme Court, **b**.

provide legal advice as requested by any member of the Executive Board as relevant to the c. Party,

ensure that the Party abides by all applicable laws and Student Body statutes, d.

file election code violations with all deliberate speed, e

and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and f. the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 4. Historian. The Historian must

maintain a sustainability plan for the Party, a.

Ь. compile the minutes of all special committees for conduct arbitration, biannual meetings, special election meetings, and constitutional amendment meetings,

C. keep a record of all notable events throughout the course of a campaign and between campaigns,

compile all articles relevant to the campaign and Inspire Party members,

d.

e. compile notable photographs and other media relevant to the campaign,

f. keep a record of any other information which may benefit future Party members or leadership,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 5. Internal Affairs Director. The Internal Affairs Director must

a. manage an anonymous survey through which members may report issues related to the Party,

b. act as the official, independent first point of contact and good-faith intermediary for resolving such issues,

c. notify the Executive Board of conflicts of interest, potential or realized,

d. attend meetings of the Executive Board as they, the Internal Affairs Director, or the Executive Board deem necessary, except when the Executive Board is in executive session,

e. be given at least 3 minutes of speaking time at the beginning of Executive Board meetings by the Executive Board, but not speak unless otherwise allowed,

f. propose to the Executive Board a remedy for any issue brought to the attention of the Internal Affairs Director, at the discretion of the Internal Affairs Director,

g. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

Section 6. Conduct Arbitration Chair. The Conduct Arbitration Chair must

a. propose special rules of order for each special committee for conduct arbitration that ensure due process according to the preponderance of evidence standard,

b. appoint default counsel for the claimant and respondent, but assist claimants and respondents in choosing different counsel if they desire,

c. educate members about the conduct arbitration process,

d. and fulfill such other duties applicable to the office as the Constitution of Inspire Party (particularly Article XII) and the parliamentary authority prescribe.

ARTICLE X — Meetings

Section 1. Delegates. Delegates, and only delegates, act on behalf of the membership at biannual meetings and special election meetings; through these meetings, delegates are the highest authority in the Party. After a general election and consultation with relevant Party officials, the Executive Board must propose a list of delegates to the Caucus. The proposed delegates on this list must

a. be Inspire-affiliated Student Government officials,

b. have been candidates for elected Student Government office with the Party in the last election,

c. be Party officers,

d. be Party staff persons,

e. or be people who canvassed five or more hours for the Party for the last campaign.

The Caucus must then approve all delegates on the list who meet the above qualifications. Before approving the list of delegates, the Caucus may add delegates to the list who meet the above

qualifications.

The Party Executive Board and Caucus may also submit to the other body additional delegates for approval, either upon their own initiative or a member's petition. Additionally, the Party Executive Board and Caucus may only grant or revoke delegate status for a biannual meeting with the approval of the other body and before the day of the biannual meeting. In adding and removing delegates, the Caucus Executive Board may act for the Caucus, but the Caucus may override the Caucus Executive Board's decision.

Section 2. Opening Statement. Following the setting of quorum at biannual meetings and special election meetings, the Secretary must give a statement. The statement should cover

a. the importance of electing officers who can work as respectful team members,

b. the importance of electing officers who can be trusted to maintain confidentiality,

c. and the importance of electing officers who can provide the Party with a diversity of thought and experience.

The Secretary must also call for delegates to consider that they may have been closer to certain staff by virtue of their position during the campaign, and that delegates should consider their personal biases when voting for officers. Delegates must also be warned about the burden of holding more than one Executive Board position.

Section 3. Biannual Meetings. The biannual meetings of the Party must be held within six weeks of the Elections Commission's consideration of validating the previous general or run-off election, whichever comes first. The only business that may be transacted at these meetings is the election of officers and the amendment of the Constitution of Inspire Party. By default, only delegates may attend or otherwise witness the biannual meeting, but in advance of the biannual meeting the Executive Board may allow specifically enumerated alumni to attend.

Section 4. Special Meetings. The Executive Board must schedule a special meeting upon submission of a petition specifying the items of discussion for the special meeting signed, electronically or physically, by one-third of the Caucus (or 20 such persons, whichever is less), or by one-third of the combined Executive Board, Independent Staff, and General Staff (or 20 such persons, whichever is less). The Executive Board must decide who may attend a special meeting. The plenary power of the Executive Board over the affairs of the Party must be respected.

Section 5. Special Election Meetings. When one or more elected offices become vacant, the Executive Board may schedule special election meetings to fill one or more of the vacancies. Delegates to the previous biannual meeting, and only those delegates, are delegates to a special election meeting. By default, only delegates may attend or otherwise witness a special election meeting, but in advance of a special election meeting the Executive Board may allow specifically enumerated alumni to attend.

Section 6. Quorum and Notice. A majority of the number of delegates present at the beginning of a biannual meeting constitutes a quorum for that biannual meeting. Delegates must be notified of the biannual meeting at least one week in advance. A majority of the number of delegates present at the beginning of a special election meeting constitutes a quorum for that special election meeting.

Delegates must be notified of a special election meeting at least one week in advance.

ARTICLE XI — The Executive Board

Section 1. Board Composition. The President, Campaign Manager, Marketing Director, Field Director, Treasurer, Policy Director, Outreach Director, and the Caucus Leader constitute the Executive Board.

Section 2. Board's Powers and Duties. The Executive Board has plenary power over the affairs of the Party, with the exception that special committees for conduct arbitration and the Judicial Board are not subject to this plenary power.

However, the Executive Board may adopt standing rules to generally govern the conduct arbitration process; a special committee for conduct arbitration must obey the standing rules as they were when the earliest petition the special committee is hearing was filed.

Additionally, the Executive Board may overturn any decision or action of the Judicial Board by a two-thirds vote provided prior notice is given, but must otherwise accommodate judicial review. The Executive Board must

a. arrange the date, time, and place of meetings,

b. invite the Caucus Executive Board to its meetings from time to time to foster cooperation and goodwill,

c. adopt standing rules for the Party regarding control of Party accounts (such as social media accounts), data (such as the voter file), and intellectual property (such as graphics members of the Marketing Team create),

d. and include in those standing rules policies that mitigate the risk of one or more people seizing control of Party accounts, data, or intellectual property against the will of the Party.

Section 3. Board Meetings. The Executive Board must regularly meet, either upon the call of the President or two members of the Executive Board. The Executive Board may waive the recording of minutes only by the unanimous consent of all members. Electronic Executive Board meetings—those with all or some participants not in the same room—may be held only using technology that enables simultaneous aural communication if and only if the Executive Board has adopted special rules of order addressing the unique needs of electronic meetings.

Section 4. Action Without Meeting. The Executive Board may adopt a motion agreed to by two-thirds of the membership of the Executive Board without meeting, provided the motion does not rescind, amend, or adopt a standing rule.

Section 5. The Executive Board may create standing committees and boards with standing authority, as explicitly granted by the Executive Board, to act on specific matters without specific instructions.

Section 6. Co-officers. If the workload of the campaign demands it, the Executive Board may grant an office on the Executive Board (except the office of President) "co-officer status" by a two-thirds vote, provided that prior notice is given. This creates a second, equal seat for the office.

a. After an office is granted co-officer status, if one person already holds the office, then there is one vacancy in the office; this vacancy may be filled (with a permanent or acting replacement) with the usual methods. After an office is granted co-officer status, if no one holds the office, then there are two vacancies in the office; each may be filled (each with permanent or acting replacements) with the usual methods.

b. In lieu of a decision of the Executive Board, the President or their designee will settle all administrative disputes regarding co-officers.

c. Each co-officer is a member of the Executive Board.

d. If the Executive Board rescinds co-officer status, only the person who held the office before the office was granted co-officer status will retain the office. However, if the Executive Board granted the office co-officer status when the office was vacant, then the Executive Board must specify in its motion to rescind co-officer status which co-officer is to retain the office. Regardless of whether the Executive Board rescinds co-officer status, at the following biannual meeting only one person will be elected to any office, and once that person is elected to office, co-officer status expires.

Section 7. Quorum and Notice. A majority of the membership of the Executive Board constitutes a quorum. Members of the Executive Board must be notified of an Executive Board meeting at least 24 hours before it takes place, although this may be waived through the consent of all members unable or unwilling to attend the meeting.

ARTICLE XII --- Special Committees for Conduct Arbitration

Section 1. Initiation. Any member may submit a petition—anonymously, if they prefer—to the Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, or Executive Board accusing an officer, Inspire-affiliated Student Government official, Independent Staff person, General Staff person, or volunteer of nonfeasance, misfeasance, malfeasance, or serious breaches of the Code of Civility. When the Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, or Executive Board receives such a petition, they must share it with the other two bodies or officers, respecting the will of some parties to remain anonymous.

If either the Internal Affairs Director, Conduct Arbitration Chair, or Executive Board deems the petition plausible, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must refer it to a special committee for conduct arbitration. The Conduct Arbitration Chair must decide which petitions a special committee will hear; the same special committee should hear related petitions.

Section 2. Appointment. The Conduct Arbitration Chair will initiate the following appointment process when a special committee for conduct arbitration is needed to hear one or more petitions. The Conduct Arbitration Chair must inform the Party Executive Board and Caucus Executive Board of the content of the petitions, respecting the will of some parties to remain anonymous.

a. The Conduct Arbitration Chair will request that the Party Executive Board appoint two people—each of whom must be a member of the Caucus or a senator-elect at the time of appointment—to the special committee. This appointment is valid once the Caucus Executive Board confirms it.

b. The Conduct Arbitration Chair will also request that the Caucus Executive Board appoint one person—who is neither a member of the Caucus, a senator-elect, nor a senate candidate at the time of appointment—to the special committee. This appointment is valid once the Party Executive Board confirms it.

c. After both appointments are confirmed, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must accept both of the appointments, and thus form the special committee, if they would result in a special committee with no more than two members self-identifying with a particular gender; otherwise, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must reject the appointments. Neither Executive Board may rescind or amend its appointments after the Conduct Arbitration Chair accepts them without the consent of the other Executive Board. The Conduct Arbitration Chair is a member and the chair of all special committees for conduct arbitration.

Section 3. Time Limits. If 60 hours have passed since the Conduct Arbitration Chair's request for appointments has been served and that special committee for conduct arbitration has not yet formed because one or both of the appointments were not made, one or both of the appointments were not confirmed, or the Conduct Arbitration Chair rejected one or both of the appointments, the Conduct Arbitration Chair rejected one or both of the appointments, the Conduct Arbitration Chair may allow

a. the Party Executive Board to appoint a member of the special committee on the Caucus Executive Board's behalf, without the need for confirmation,

b. and/or the Caucus Executive Board to appoint members of the special committee on the Party Executive Board's behalf, without the need for confirmation.

Section 4. Conduct, Resignation, and Vacancies. Members of a special committee for conduct arbitration other than the Conduct Arbitration Chair must avoid learning of the details of the petition(s) in advance. Any member of a special committee may submit their resignation to the Conduct Arbitration Chair for action. The Conduct Arbitration Chair may fill vacancies in a special committee if both Executive Boards cannot agree on a replacement member within 24 hours after the Chair accepts the resignation.

In the event the petition directly states the Conduct Arbitration Chair as a respondent or claimant, the Judicial Board will determine whether the Conduct Arbitration Chair is fit to handle that petition. If the Conduct Arbitration Chair is determined unfit, the Judicial Board will appoint either the Internal Affairs Director or Chair of the Judicial Board to serve as Conduct Arbitration Chair for that petition in all further respects.

Section 5. Notice and Quorum. After a special committee for conduct arbitration is formed and the Conduct Arbitration Chair has referred one or more petitions to it, the Conduct Arbitration Chair will call a meeting of the special committee. Before calling the meeting, the Conduct Arbitration Chair must tell the filers of the petition (the claimants) and those the petition accuses (the respondents) that the Chair intends to call the meeting and give them, the claimants and respondents, 24 hours to communicate their availability.

The claimants, respondents, counsel, the Caucus Executive Board, the Party Executive Board, and members of the special committee must be notified of the meeting and the proposed special rules of order at least four days in advance. Three-quarters of the membership of a special committee for arbitration constitutes a quorum. Section 6. Process. At the meeting, the special committee for conduct arbitration will hear the petitions referred to it and may rule on them. The claimants and respondents may appoint counsel to represent them during the meeting.

a. The meeting must begin with only the special committee members, claimants, respondents, and counsel in the meeting hall. First, each special committee must adopt special rules of order that ensure due process according to the preponderance of evidence standard. Claimants and respondents, or their counsel, may comment on the proposed special rules of order and propose amendments before their adoption.

b. Then, the special committee must decide—in consultation with the claimants, respondents, and their counsel—what evidence and testimony may be considered and whether it may be considered in the presence of other members. The Chair may strike evidence from the special committee's consideration, but the special committee may reverse any such determination.

c. Upon the protest of the claimants or respondents regarding some evidence or testimony, the special committee must be unanimous in its decision to allow that evidence or testimony to be considered in the presence of other members.

d. Only after the adoption of special rules of order and the aforementioned evidence and testimony decisions may the special committee allow members who are not the claimants, respondents, or their counsel into the meeting hall; the special committee may receive comments from these members during a hearing portion of the meeting. But a special committee that meets without ever allowing members into the meeting hall must make this meeting known to the Party.

e. The special committee must respect the will of all involved parties who wish to remain anonymous and the need for some evidence (including testimony) to remain confidential. The special committee for conduct arbitration must consider circumstances such as cooperation (or lack thereof) with the committee's investigation(s) when ruling.

Section 7. Powers. Members of a special committee for conduct arbitration, as well as the Internal Affairs Director, may subpoen a witnesses and evidence for the meeting. All Party members must comply with subpoenas. A special committee for conduct arbitration may, in its ruling,

a. require a respondent publicly apologize to members of the Party,

b. recommend a respondent face some other remedy, such as removal from office or having their appointment rescinded,

c. or recommend a respondent face some other remedy, such as removal from office or having their appointment rescinded, if their conduct remains poor.

Section 8. Continuation and Dissolution. If a special committee for conduct arbitration adjourns a meeting without having completed its work, the Conduct Arbitration Chair will call the next meeting of the special committee, giving notice to those involved in the proceedings. A special committee must dissolve itself after hearing all petitions referred to it.

ARTICLE XIII — The Judicial Board

Section 1. Board Composition. The Independent Staff who are not members of the Executive Board constitute the Judicial Board. The Judicial Board must elect a Chair of the Judicial Board from among its membership.

Section 2. Board's Powers and Duties. The Judicial Board may rule on whether an act of the Party violated the Constitution or a standing rule. The Board may also rule on whether a standing rule violates the Constitution. Rulings of the Board are binding upon all Party members and officials and may include injunctive relief. The Board has general subpoena power over the Party.

Section 3. Board Meetings. The Judicial Board will meet upon the call of the Chair or two members.

Section 4. Process. Upon receiving a petition from a member identifying a violation, the Chair of the Judicial Board will share it with the other Board members.

a. If two members of the Board find the petition worthy of the Board's consideration, the Chair must schedule a meeting of the Judicial Board to rule on the petition.

b. As appropriate, the Board will find the Constitution of the Inspire Senate Caucus persuasive in its rulings.

c. The Board must write an opinion after ruling and deliver it to the Executive Board, and only the Executive Board.

Section 5. Notice, Quorum, and Rules. Board members must have 24 hours' notice before a meeting. A majority of the membership of the Board constitutes a quorum. The Board must adopt rules to govern the judicial review process.

ARTICLE XIV — Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised must govern the Party in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of Inspire Party and any special rules of order the Party may adopt.

ARTICLE XV — Amendment of Constitution

Section 1. The Constitution of Inspire Party may be amended by a two-thirds vote at the biannual meeting, provided that prior notice is given. Each biannual meeting may adopt special rules of order allowing delegates not present at the meeting to vote remotely on the final passage of constitutional amendments; secure electronic balloting must be used for remote voting on the final passage of constitutional amendments and may also be used for local voting.

Section 2. The Constitution of Inspire Party may be amended by a two-thirds vote at a constitutional amendment meeting called by the Executive Board or Caucus, provided that prior notice is given. For the purposes of a constitutional amendment meeting, the combined Independent Staff and voting membership of the Executive Board constitutes the membership, a majority of the membership constitutes a quorum, and the Secretary must serve as chair. General Staff and members of the Caucus may speak at constitutional amendment meetings.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:54 P.M.

The adjourned meeting of the biannual meeting of Inspire Party took place on Sunday, October 20th, 2019 at 12:27 P.M., at the Hume Classroom, Secretary Michael Hoffman being in the chair.

Party Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed the following agenda, which was adopted.

At approximately 1:30 P.M. and 3:00 P.M. at the discretion of the chair to avoid a disruptive recess, the meeting will recess for 5 minutes.

The minutes from the regular biannual meeting was approved as read.

Party Secretary Michael Hoffman proposed special rules of order. They were adopted as follows after amendment.

RULE I — Election Presentation, Questioning, and Debate

Section 1. Following nominations, each nominee will have seven minutes to present (with visual aids at the discretion of the chair) and then four minutes to answer questions. The chair will call on delegates to ask questions. No individual may present and answer questions for more than two offices. For the offices of President and Campaign Manager, each nominee will have nine minutes to present and and five to answer questions. Section 2. Debate. Following the conclusion of presentations and questioning for all nominees, the Party will debate each nominee in the same order presentations were made. In the debate on each nominee, no delegate may give a speech longer than two minutes and no delegate may speak more than twice with regard to a nominee.

Section 3. Closing Statements. Following debate, each nominee will have three minutes to make a closing statement (with visual aids at the discretion of the chair) and answer questions. The chair will call on delegates to ask questions. The order of closing statements will be opposite the order that presentations were made in. For the offices of President and Campaign Manager, closing statements will last four minutes.

Section 4. This procedure need not occur again if the Party chooses to reopen and close nominations, unless the Party decides otherwise.

RULE II --- Electronic Voting

Section 1. All absent delegates who have registered with the chair to vote remotely may do so for elections and on the final passage of constitutional amendments. Delegates who are present at the meeting but are in the remote voting GroupMe for administrative purposes must vote using the GroupMe poll.

Section 2. All absent delegates who have registered with the chair to vote remotely may view a livestream of the meeting. Any recordings of the livestream must be deleted after the meeting.

Section 3. The chair should keep electronic balloting open for two minutes, or until all registered delegates have voted. The chair may extend time for electronic balloting.

RULE III — Remote Running for Office

Nominees may designate to the Party Secretary a proxy to exercise Rule I on their behalf. Alternatively, nominees may give a presentation, answer questions, and make a closing statement through video or audio conferencing software if they inform the Party Secretary in advance.

RULE IV — Privacy

Everyone in the meeting hall must be a delegate. However, if a non-delegate has declared their intent to run for office with the Secretary and a delegate confirms they will nominate the non-delegate, then that non-delegate may only be in the meeting hall during the election of the office(s) they intend to run for.

RULE V — Protected Identities

If a delegate believes a question/statement of theirs in questioning or debate would reveal themselves to be a member of a community they would not like to be revealed a part of, that delegate may message their question/statement to the Internal Affairs Director, or the Director's designee. The Internal Affairs Director, if they are reasonably sure that delegate fits the criteria for this procedure, will then ask/make the question/statement on the delegate's behalf. Such statements will not count against the Internal Affairs Director's speaking limit.

Secretary Michael Hoffman asked if there was any objection to "forming a committee consisting of Michael Hoffman, Isabella Garcia, and Lindsay Spruce to approve the minutes from this meeting." The motion was adopted by unanimous consent.

Secretary Michael Hoffman delivered opening remarks.

The rules were suspended to "elect the Field Director."

Patrick Lewicki and Spencer Gorelick were nominated as candidates for Field Director

The first round of balloting for Field Director yielded the following results: Number of votes cast - 45 Necessary for election (majority) - 23 Reopen Nominations - 1 Spencer Gorelick - 43 Patrick Lewicki - 2 Spencer Gorelick was elected Field Director.

Zachary Amrose moved to "postpone Mr. Gorelick's oath of office until the first executive board meeting." The motion was adopted.

Kristen moved to "suspend the rules to elect the Outreach Director next." The motion was adopted.

Colin Solomon was nominated as a candidate for Outreach Director. Colin Solomon was elected Outreach Director by unanimous consent.

Jasmin Du Bois was nominated as a candidate for Conduct Arbitration Chair. Jasmin Du Bois was elected Conduct Arbitration Chair by unanimous consent.

Sparsha Muralidhara was nominated as a candidate for Policy Director. Sparsha Muralidhara was elected Policy Director by unanimous consent.

Zachary Amrose was nominated as candidate for President

The first round of balloting for President yielded the following results: Number of votes cast - 43 Necessary for election (majority) - 22 Reopen Nominations - 9 Zachary Amrose received - 34

Zachary Amrose was elected President.

Kristen Jackson was nominated as a candidate for Campaign Manager Kristen Jackson was elected Campaign Manager by unanimous consent

Sophia Ahmed and Yanissa Rodriguez were nominated as candidates for Marketing Director

The first round of balloting for Marketing Director yielded the following results: Number of votes cast - 40 Necessary for election (majority) - 21 Reopen Nominations - 1 Sophia Ahmed received - 14 Yanissa Rodriguez - 25 Yanissa Rodriguez was elected Marketing Directo.

Joey McGinn was nominated as a candidate for Internal Affairs Director. Joey McGinn was elected Internal Affairs Director by unanimous consent.

Matthew Barocas was nominated as candidate for Treasurer. Matthew Barocas was elected Treasurer by unanimous consent.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 4:30 P.M.

The committee approved the minutes of the adjourned meeting on February 9, 2020.

Violation of 700.4(k), 761.1

On January 8th, 2020, by 11:59 PM, Gator Party Student Body President Candidate Trevor Pope distributed a campaign material entitled "Trevor Pope Nominated for UF Student Body President" on the website associated with his fraternity at www.pikappgator.org, thus illegally publicly distributing an unregistered campaign material lacking required disclaimers which illegally implies benefits to a student organization weeks before the start of the election cycle.

This campaign material, written by Pope, includes several instances of Pope illegally engaging in campaigning before the election cycle began.

§700.4(k) defines the election cycle as "the time from the beginning of the informational meeting held by the Supervisor of Elections pursuant to 713.0 until validation of the election by the Student Senate".

§761.1 mandates that "Campaign Activities begin on the first day of the active election cycle and ends immediately after the close of polls on the final day of elections."

§700.4(d) defines campaigning as "any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office, including, but not limited to the distribution of literature and posting of election specific materials. "Campaigning" does not include maintaining a website excluded to providing general information about the party and party members, or wearing campaign material, as defined in 700.4(f), a campaign shirt, a button, an emblem or similar paraphernalia, unless accompanied by the dissemination of campaign literature or the delivery of a campaign speech to solicit support for a candidate or political party."

The election cycle began on January 21st, 2020, at 6:30 PM, when the informational meeting held by the Supervisor of Elections pursuant to §713.0 began. Distributing campaign materials, as defined by §700.4(f), prior to the beginning of the election cycle is prohibited. Gator Party and Pope distributed campaign materials for approximately two weeks before legally allowed to do so, thus engaging in illegal campaigning, as defined in §700.4(d).

In this publicly accessible campaign material posted for any student and/or human to access through the internet on January 8th, 2020, Pope says that "I am writing to request your support to help me become the first member of Pi Kappa Phi to serve as Student Body President of the University of Florida. I was recently named the Gator Party nominee to run as their candidate for office."

Pope even solicits financial contributions in this campaign material, stating that "[i]n order to be successful, I need your financial support of my candidacy for Student Body President. The election will take place on February 19th and 20th *[sic]*, and I would appreciate any amount you can give and any advice you may have. If you are able to give, please make the check payable to Trevor for President, [REDACTED STREET

ADDRESS], and I also accept Venmo @[REDACTED VENMO ACCOUNT]. If you have any questions or concerns, do not hesitate to reach out to me directly at [REDACTED PHONE NUMBER] or [REDACTED EMAIL ADDRESS]."

Thus, Gator Party and Trevor Pope engaged in illegal campaign activity by distributing campaign material which solicits support for Gator Party and Pope weeks before the start of the election cycle.

Each incident of distributing campaign materials prior to the start of the election cycle is a violation of §700.4(k) and §761.1. Because Gator Party and Pope distributed this campaign material approximately two weeks before the start of the election cycle, Gator Party and Pope violated §700.4(k) and §761.1.

Violation of 761.4

On January 8th, 2020, by 11:59 PM, Gator Party Student Body President Candidate Trevor Pope distributed a campaign material entitled "Trevor Pope Nominated for UF Student Body President" on the website associated with his fraternity at www.pikappgator.org, thus illegally publicly distributing an unregistered campaign material lacking required disclaimers which illegally implies benefits to a student organization weeks before the start of the election cycle.

By indicating that his election to Student Body President will result in various illegal benefits for members of his fraternity, Pope violates §761.4.

§761.4 states that "No candidate shall give, offer, or promise to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization."

Pope continues by illegally offering benefits not authorized by student body law for members of his fraternity in return for his election as Student Body President with Gator Party, boasting that "[i]f I am fortunate enough to attain this honor, not only will this improve the [UF Pi Kappa Phi] chapter's overall standing with UF's administration, but it also enhances our fraternity's image across campus. Further, this will enable younger Pi Kapp brothers to become more actively involved on-campus. I truly believe that our active chapter will greatly benefit from having a representative on the Board of Trustees at UF as well as in the role of Student Body President".

Thus, in return for support of members of his fraternity, Pope indicates that members of his fraternity can expect that they will benefit in several ways not authorized by student body law. Pope states that his fraternity's chapter will improve in its standing with UF's administration if he is elected. Pope states that his fraternity's chapter will experience an enhanced image across campus if he is elected. Pope states that members of his fraternity's chapter will be enabled to become more actively involved on campus if he is elected. Pope states that his fraternity's that he truly believes that his fraternity's chapter will greatly benefit from having a representative on the Board of Trustees at UF as well as in the role of Student Body President. Each of these statements promises some kind of benefit not authorized by student body law for Pope's fraternity in return for support for Pope's election.

Each incident of giving, offering, or promising to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization is a violation of §761.4. Because Gator Party and Pope distributed a campaign material which repeatedly engages in this unethical activity, Gator Party and Pope violated §761.4.

Violation of 762.0

On January 8th, 2020, by 11:59 PM, Gator Party Student Body President Candidate Trevor Pope distributed a campaign material entitled "Trevor Pope Nominated for UF Student Body President" on the website associated with his fraternity at www.pikappgator.org, thus illegally publicly distributing an unregistered campaign material lacking required disclaimers which illegally implies benefits to a student organization weeks before the start of the election cycle.

This campaign material was distributed despite not being properly registered with the Supervisor of Elections as required by §762.0, as this campaign material was distributed before the election cycle began—and thus before any campaign materials could legally be registered with the Supervisor of Elections—pursuant to §762.0, inter alia.

§762.0 states that "Candidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material. In addition, all campaign material must be registered with the Supervisor of Elections or his or her Assistant Supervisors of Elections prior to the time of distribution. Procedures for distribution and posting of campaign material not provided for by the Student Government Election Code may be established by the Supervisor of Elections or by the Elections Commission. However, such procedures shall not be inconsistent with the Student Government Election Code and they shall not be effective unless presented in writing to the candidates and registered political parties twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time that any such procedures take effect."

Failing to register a campaign material with the Supervisor of Elections, as Gator Party and Pope clearly engaged in, is a violation of §762.0's requirement that "*all campaign material must be registered with the Supervisor of Elections or his or her Assistant Supervisors of Elections prior to the time of distribution.*"

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This campaign material was distributed with no statutorily mandated indication of the individual responsible for the campaign material in the format required by §762.0, as "[c]andidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material."

By not indicating any particular person responsible for the distribution of the campaign material through the use of the words "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections, Gator Party and Pope clearly violated §762.0's requirement that such a disclaimer be included in all campaign materials.

Describe what happened (be specific - include time and dates):

Abstract

On January 19th, 2020, at and around 8:17 PM, Gator Party held a secret meeting during which campaign materials were prepared and the Gator Party campaign was organized. Much of this evidence was collected by a person who felt an obligation to document an ongoing campaign violation to ensure a free and fair election, regardless of social and physical barriers presented.

According to the Department of Student Activities and Involvement ("SAI"), Kappa Sigma—the entity which reserved the classroom in which the secret meeting transpired—is a registered student organization. All registered student organizations must comply with an SAI policy mandating that "Membership in [each] organization is open to all enrolled students at the University of Florida." Student organizations registered with SAI cannot prevent an enrolled student from engaging in the privileges of membership outside a fraternity house. Thus, the concerned student had every right to be present and document an ongoing campaign violation to ensure a free and fair election, regardless of social and physical barriers presented.

Violation of 700.4(k), 761.1

Evidence provided is proof that Gator Party operated outside of election cycles, violating §700.4(k) and §761.1.

§700.4(k) defines the election cycle as "the time from the beginning of the informational meeting held by the Supervisor of Elections pursuant to 713.0 until validation of the election by the Student Senate".

§761.1 mandates that "Campaign Activities begin on the first day of the active election cycle and ends immediately after the close of polls on the final day of elections."

By attending this secret meeting (during which campaign materials were prepared and the Gator Party campaign was organized) the attendees of this meeting, which constitute the membership of Gator Party, campaigned, as they expressed support for Gator Party, which is currently running candidates for Student Government office, and laid the groundwork for the Spring 2020 campaign before the official campaign cycle had begun. This presents not only a violation of the student body statutes, but also an unfair advantage over other parties and candidates, as Gator Party operated outside of campaign season and thus had undue time to prepare their campaign relative to other parties and candidates.

§700.4(d) defines "Campaigning" as "any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office, including, but not limited to the distribution of literature and posting of election specific materials. "Campaigning" does not include maintaining a website excluded to providing general information about the party and party members, or wearing campaign material, as defined in 700.4(f), a campaign shirt, a button, an emblem or similar paraphernalia, unless accompanied by the

dissemination of campaign literature or the delivery of a campaign speech to solicit support for a candidate or political party."


Campaign materials present at the secret meeting include a list of Gator Party's campaign team members, documents outlining the content of the secret meeting, computer files which would later be used by Gator Party during the election cycle, and more. Each of these campaign materials evidences or constitutes "intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office."

Indeed, a Gator Party Senate candidate who was documented attending the secret meeting, Nick Meyer, referred to the secret meeting as "our campaign meeting" in a Snapchat message he sent, as recorded below, thus proving beyond doubt that this secret meeting was a Gator Party "campaign meeting" occurring before the election cycle began.

Describe what happened (be specific - include time and dates):

Abstract

On January 19th, 2020, at and around 8:17 PM, Gator Party held a secret meeting during which sheets of petitions in support of placing Gator Party's executive candidates on the ballot in the Spring 2020 election cycle were collected. This meeting took place after the Fall 2019 campaign cycle had concluded and before the Spring 2020 election cycle had begun. Much of this evidence was collected by a person who felt an obligation to document an ongoing campaign violation to ensure a free and fair election, regardless of social and physical barriers presented.

According to the Department of Student Activities and Involvement ("SAI"), Kappa Sigma—the entity which reserved the classroom in which the secret meeting transpired—is a registered student organization. All registered student organizations must comply with an SAI policy mandating that "Membership in [each] organization is open to all enrolled students at the University of Florida." Student organizations registered with SAI cannot prevent an enrolled student from engaging in the privileges of membership outside a fraternity house. Thus, the concerned student had every right to be present and document an ongoing campaign violation to ensure a free and fair election, regardless of social and physical barriers presented.

Violation of 700.4(k), 761.1

Evidence provided is proof that Gator Party operated outside of election cycles, violating §700.4(k) and §761.1.

§700.4(k) defines the election cycle as "the time from the beginning of the informational meeting held by the Supervisor of Elections pursuant to 713.0 until validation of the election by the Student Senate".

§761.1 mandates that "Campaign Activities begin on the first day of the active election cycle and ends immediately after the close of polls on the final day of elections."

By attending this secret meeting (during which campaign materials were prepared, the Gator Party campaign was organized, <u>and sheets of petitions in support of placing Gator Party's executive candidates on the ballot in the Spring 2020 election cycle were collected</u>) the attendees of this meeting, which constitute the membership of Gator Party, campaigned, as they expressed support for Gator Party, which is currently running candidates for Student Government office, and laid the groundwork for the Spring 2020 campaign before the official campaign cycle had begun. This presents not only a violation of the student body statutes, but also an unfair advantage over other parties and candidates, as Gator Party operated outside of campaign season and thus had undue time to prepare their campaign relative to other parties and candidates.

Uniquely egregiously, sheets of petitions in support of placing Gator Party's executive candidates on the ballot in the Spring 2020 election cycle were collected at the secret meeting. These sheets included at least 44 students' signatures in support of placing Gator Party's executive candidates on the ballot in the Spring 2020 election cycle, despite the fact that the Spring 2020 election cycle had not yet begun at the time of signing. This proves that Gator Party made an intentional action in support of a candidate or political party, and therefore campaigned, outside of an active election cycle.

§732.11 states that "Candidates for President and Vice President shall run on a joint ticket and shall submit a single supporting petition as described in 732.12 in order to sustain their candidacy. Candidates for Treasurer shall also submit a supporting petition in order to sustain his or her candidacy."

§732.12 states that "A supporting petition shall bear the names, student identification numbers, and signatures of currently registered University of Florida students totaling not less than 15% of the number of votes cast for the singular candidate who received the most votes in the last presidential election, excluding run-offs, or 300 signatures, whichever is less. The text of the supporting petition shall be to the effect that: "We the undersigned students at the University of Florida, do hereby approve the candidacy of ______ for President of the Student Body and of ______ for Vice President of the Student Body, as (candidates of the ______ party)(independent candidates)." The text of the supporting petition shall accurately reflect the party affiliation of the candidates."

§700.4(d) defines "Campaigning" as "any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office, including, but not limited to the distribution of literature and posting of election specific materials. "Campaigning" does not include maintaining a website excluded to providing general information about the party and party members, or wearing campaign material, as defined in 700.4(f), a campaign shirt, a button, an emblem or similar paraphernalia, unless accompanied by the dissemination of campaign literature or the delivery of a campaign speech to solicit support for a candidate or political party."

Organizing students to sign "a supporting petition as described in 732.12 in order to sustain [Gator Party executive candidates'] candidacy," as per §732.11 and §732.12, clearly constitutes "intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office," as "campaigning" is defined in §700.4(d). Such campaigning is prohibited prior to the official start of the campaign cycle, which occurred after the these supporting petitions were documented.

Thus, by collecting petition signatures in support of placing Gator Party's executive candidates on the ballot well before the election cycle began, Gator Party violated §700.4(k) and §761.1.


Additional campaign materials present at the secret meeting include a list of Gator Party's campaign team members, documents outlining the content of the secret meeting, computer files which would later be used by Gator Party during the election cycle, and more. Each of these campaign materials further supplements evidence or constitutes "intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office."


Indeed, a Gator Party Senate candidate who was documented attending the secret meeting, Nick Meyer, referred to the secret meeting as "our campaign meeting" in a Snapchat message he sent, as recorded below, thus proving beyond doubt that this secret meeting was a Gator Party "campaign meeting" occurring before the election cycle began.

Abstract

On January 23rd, 2020, at 8:45 AM, Gator Party registered as a political party, submitting materials which would be used by the Supervisor of Elections to register Gator Party as a student organization. Gator Party failed to adopt a constitution that is in compliance with the regulations for student organizations set by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement ("SAI"), thus violating §746.0 and SAI rules by failing to adopt a constitution which includes verbatim language mandated by SAI rules.

Violation of 746.0

§746.0 states that "All political parties must comply with all rules and regulations governing student organizations set forth by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement."

SAI has set forth a guideline for the constitutions of student organizations, of which Gator Party is set forth by §741.2.

§741.2 states that "The Supervisor of Elections shall submit a copy of each political party's registration information to the Director of the Department of Student Activities and Involvement for registration as a student organization. Registration shall be valid through the tenth day after the results of the election are announced."

One of the guidelines for student organizations that SAI sets forth is that Article IV of each constitution must include certain verbatim sections on non-discrimination, sexual harassment, hazing, and responsibility to report.

Gator Party is in direct violation of §746.0 and SAI rules by failing to adopt a constitution which includes verbatim language mandated by SAI rules. Furthermore, Gator Party's behavior is dangerous, as it puts students who are suffering from discrimination, sexual harassment, and/or hazing in a difficult position by not assuring that this behavior will be reported to the appropriate authorities.

Critically, the student body statutes specify that the information which the Supervisor of Elections must use when registering Student Government political parties as student organizations is "a copy of each political party's registration information," as per §741.2. Each political party's registration information is limited to the following information, as collected by the Supervisor of Elections during the current election cycle.

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Notably absent among these fields used by the Supervisor of Elections to register Gator Party as a student organization is a compliant constitution from Gator Party. Because Gator Party did not make a compliant constitution available to the Supervisor of Elections, as per §741.2, the Supervisor of Elections could not have possibly submitted to SAI a compliant constitution of Gator Party when registering Gator Party as a student organization, pursuant to §741.2. Therefore, Gator Party was not registered with a compliant constitution when

registered as a student organization, thus violating §746.0 and SAI rules by failing to adopt a constitution which includes verbatim language mandated by SAI rules.

Violation of 762.0

On February 19th, 2020, at approximately 1:52 PM, Gator Party Student Body Vice President candidate Lauredan Offical maintained a "story" on Instagram showing Gator Party campaign material, including imagery of a man holding a sign reading "Vote Gator Party" along with a part of a Gator Party logo; clearly indicating the material's association with Gator Party and Offical's candidacy. The "story" is campaign material per §700.4(f), as it contains content supportive of Gator Party and Offical. The "story" did not discernibly include the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections, and otherwise does not seem to be registered with the Supervisor of Elections, as required by §762.0. Therefore, a violation of §762.0 occurred.

§762.0 states "Candidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material. In addition, all campaign material must be registered with the Supervisor of Elections or his or her Assistant Supervisors of Elections prior to the time of distribution. Procedures for distribution and posting of campaign material not provided for by the Student Government Election Code may be established by the Supervisor of Elections or by the Elections Commission. However, such procedures shall not be inconsistent with the Student Government Election Code and they shall not be effective unless presented in writing to the candidates and registered political parties twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time that any such procedures take effect."

§700.4(f) states "(f) "Campaign Material" means any print or electronic material used for the purpose of supporting a candidate or political party for an elective Student Body office, an initiative, a referendum question or proposed constitutional amendment. "Campaign material" shall include, but not be limited to, fliers, banners, posters, placards, electronic mail internet posts, and clothing".

On February 18th, 2020, at approximately 12:55 PM, a Facebook post was made in a Facebook group entitled "Back on Our BS (Buy and Sell)" that clearly indicated the existence of a "requirement" that members of the University of Florida chapter of Sigma Kappa submit "I Voted" stickers to an individual named Daniela Hernandez. Gator Party Leader Gabbi Hernandez and Gator Party Senator Lindsey Kaighin positively interacted with this Facebook post, indicating their and Gator Party's tacit endorsements of the post's content. This post, its comments, and the "requirement" cited constitute an illicit distribution of an unregistered campaign material lacking required disclaimers which illegally implies benefits to members of a student organization.

By indicating that the intended audience of her post is required to submit "I Voted" stickers, Daniela Hernandez indicates that members of the organization will receive a benefit contingent on their votes: the benefit of not being subject to repercussions if they were to have violated the "requirement". By offering their tacit endorsements of this post and the therein described scheme of "I Voted" sticker collection, Gabbi Hernandez, Kaighin, and Gator Party violate §761.4, as they are complicit in the act of giving, offering, or promising a student or student organization a benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization. Organizations members may have felt compelled to vote for Gator Party as a result of the endorsements of Gabbi Hernandez and Kaighin.

§761.4 states that "No candidate shall give, offer, or promise to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization."

The comment section of the post contains further evidence of the execution of an illicit system of benefits designed to garner votes for Gabbi Hernandez and Kaighin's Gator Party. One comment reads "is anyone collecting stickers rn?". In response, Daniela Hernandez writes "not at this moment but if you write your name and leave it in my mailbox I'll grab it when I get there around 2 pm". Through these comments and the original post, members of the University of Florida chapter of Sigma Kappa were subject to the benefit of freedom from any repercussions stemming from a violation of the aforementioned "requirement". The freedom to vote when, if, and how one chooses is a foundational principle of our campus democracy that was herein contravened.

Each incident of giving, offering, or promising to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization is a violation of §761.4. Because Gator Party members Gabbi Hernandez and Kaighin distributed campaign material which engages in this unethical and illicit activity, Gator Party, Gabbi Hernandez and Kaighin violated §761.4.

On January 17th, 2020, at 5:17 PM, the Student Government Facebook page posted a post announcing that the Student Government agency "Chomp the Vote will be handing out Norman Starbucks vouchers to students who show their 'I Voted' sticker tomorrow and Wednesday from 10 AM to 8 PM!" On February 18th, 2020, and February 19th, 2020, Chomp the Vote distributed an indeterminately high number of such Norman Starbucks vouchers to students who showed their "I Voted" sticker, thus giving a gift of "A VOUCHER FOR A FREE TALL HANDCRAFTED BEVERAGE FROM NORMAN STARBUCKS" to "students who show their 'I Voted' sticker". By facilitating gift-giving in exchange for votes prohibited by §761.4, each Gator Party candidate who is a member of Chomp the Vote violated §761.4 on behalf of Gator Party and their own candidacies by facilitating the distribution of a prohibited benefit in exchange for votes.

§761.4 states that "No candidate shall give, offer, or promise to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization."

No student body statute authorizes Student Government or any of its parts to distribute gifts in exchange for votes. Such unethical behavior is prohibited by §761.4.

Gator Party candidates Nick Meyer and Kevin Trejos are members of Chomp the Vote Staff. Chomp the Vote offered benefits in return for voting, thus affecting voting behavior. Thus, these candidates and Gator Party are responsible for an indeterminately high number of violations of §761.4.

Each incident of giving, offering, or promising to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization is a violation of §761.4. Because Gator Party and its candidates Meyer and Trejos facilitated the distribution of a prohibited benefit in exchange for votes through their support for Chomp the Vote as Staff members, Gator Party and these candidates violated §761.4.

§746.0 states that "All political parties must comply with all rules and regulations governing student organizations set forth by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement."

Since at least the time of its registration on January 23rd, 2020, at 8:45 AM, the Gator Party's very name, in addition to other materials like comments, slogans, and other campaign materials, violates the University of Florida SAI policies, as it utilizes the "Gator" mascot and name, which could reasonably confuse voters and imply endorsement of the University of Florida. Indeed, among other instances, Gator Party utilized an official University of Florida logo when announcing executive candidates.

SAI policy specifically states:

Student organizations are separate entities from the University, therefore, student organizations are prohibited from referring to themselves as being part of the University. Thus, no student organizations may include: "University of Florida", "UF", or "Gators" in the name of their organization.

The use of the name "Gator" contravenes this policy, thus Gator Party violates §746.0.

Each incident of giving, offering, or promising to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization is a violation of §761.4. Because Gator Party and its candidates repeatedly engaged in this unethical activity, Gator Party and its candidates violated §761.4.

However, such procedures shall not be inconsistent with the Student Government Election Code and they shall not be effective unless presented in writing to the candidates and registered political parties twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time that any such procedures take effect."

On February 17th, 2020, at approximately 10:14 PM, Gator Party Campaign Coordinator Damon Veras distributed a campaign material through a message sent to the apolitical 'HSA Familia' GroupMe chat containing hundreds of members, thus illegally publicly distributing an unregistered campaign material lacking required disclaimers which illegally implies benefits to members of a student organization.

Veras sent three messages.

The first message, sent on February 17th, 2020, at 10:13 PM, reads "Hi cuties! Remember to go vote in SG elections tomorrow! Here's a little incentive to feed your caffeine addictions! If you're anything like me, voting just got way easier... [COFFEE MUG EMOJI, STARSTRUCK EMOJI, LAUGH EMOJI]". This message also contains images.

The second message, sent on February 17th, 2020, at 10:14 PM, reads "Regarding SG elections tomorrow, there is absolutely NO EXCUSE for our chapter to not reach our goal of getting all of our votes in by noon tomorrow. @Tyler Lucas Is literally offering rides to the polls tomorrow morning, and you'll have brothers with cars. Please be there for each other. Keep in mind the nice incentive spoke about at chapter that we can all enjoy. Check DTL for a refresher to your memory. Text me or Tyler if you have conflicts; check your schedules/calendars for tomorrow now to make sure you can have your vote in and everything in to Jack by noon tomorrow. Long Live TKE".

The third message, sent on February 17th, 2020, at 10:14 PM, reads "Please ignore this message. Wrong chat^".

By indicating that the intended audience of his message will receive a benefit contingent on their votes, Veras violates §761.4, as he gives, offers, or promises to any student or student organization a benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization.

§761.4 states that "No candidate shall give, offer, or promise to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization."

As a Campaign Coordinator of Gator Party and Historian of Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity ("TKE"), Veras shares that Tyler Lucas, the President of TKE, is "literally offering rides to the polls", while Veras is also aggressively soliciting voting among TKE members and speaking to "the nice incentive discussed at chapter that we can all enjoy". Thus, two different benefits are offered to intended recipients of the messages in return for voting in an election—free, convenient transportation offered by the TKE president, and a mysterious 'incentive' discussed at chapter. By facilitating the offering of each of these two different benefits, Veras violates §761.4 on behalf of Gator Party, of which he is a Campaign Coordinator, through distributions of these campaign materials.

Regardless of whether these messages were delivered to TKE, they were documented as distributed by Veras among the 500+ members of the apolitical 'HSA Familia' GroupMe chat, thus inflicting arguably greater damage than these messages could have possibly inflicted had it only been distributed to TKE. Indeed, Veras' friends and acquaintances in the apolitical 'HSA Familia' GroupMe chat may now feel compelled to vote for Gator Party, knowing that Veras and the party he represents (his profile image in the GroupMe chat is a Gator Party campaign material) would attempt to engage in such unethical activities as implied by these messages.

Each incident of giving, offering, or promising to any student or student organization any benefit not authorized by student body law in order to influence the votes of that student or members of that organization is a violation of §761.4. Because Gator Party and Veras distributed a campaign material which engages in this unethical activity, Gator Party and Veras violated §761.4.

By facilitating the offering of each of these two different benefits, Veras violates §761.4 on behalf of Gator Party, of which he is a Campaign Coordinator, through distributions of these campaign materials.

This campaign material was distributed with no statutorily mandated indication of the individual responsible for the campaign material in the format required by §762.0, as "[c]andidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material."

By not indicating any particular person responsible for the distribution of the campaign material through the use of the words "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections, Gator Party and Veras clearly violated §762.0's requirement that such a disclaimer be included in all campaign materials.

Violation of 746.0

By January 22nd, 2020, at 11:59 PM, Gator Party falsified records to improperly reserve classrooms for campaigning purposes, violating §746.0.

On several occasions, Gator Party met in classrooms around campus for secret campaign meetings. Gator Party reserved these classrooms for their secret campaign meetings under the event title "Committee Meeting" or "Kappa Sigma Committee Meeting", under Trey Banco's name. Banco is a Campaign Manager of Gator Party.

Banco reserved law school rooms for a "Committee Meeting" throughout the Student Government campaign cycle. He also reserved law school rooms for a "Committee Meeting" on several occasions in the week before the campaign cycle began.

Attached are images showing that Banco has booked rooms for a "Committee Meeting" in the law school over 20 times throughout the Student Government campaign cycle.

Curiously, Banco also reserved nearby rooms in the law school at the same times for the fraternity he is president of, Kappa Sigma, as "Kappa Sigma Committee Meeting".

Banco has 11 room reservations for "Kappa Sigma Committee Meeting" throughout the campaign cycle, each of which is at the same time as one of Banco's "Committee Meeting" reservations.

Nearly every other room reservation booked by a student organization transparently identifies the organization which is meeting, as other student organizations have nothing to hide. Gator Party abused the room reservation process to lie to the university and to the students about the purpose of their meetings, in the process violating SAI policies and student body statutes. Other student organizations, which could have used these classrooms for legal purposes, were prevented from legally enjoying the university resources they work hard for because of Gator Party's nefarious actions.

Gator Party's use of classroom spaces when not reserved for this purpose constitutes a violation of §746.0, which states that "All political parties must comply with all rules and regulations governing student organizations set forth by the Department of Student Activities and Involvement." Therefore, a violation of §746.0 occurred.

Gator Party using classrooms for secret campaign meetings at the time and place when the Gator Party Campaign Manager had reserved the space for a fraternity he is president of is a violation of a Student Activities and Involvement regulation which states that "All student organization events or programs (excluding general organization meetings), that take place on University grounds, require an Event Permit obtained by completing a request through Gator Connect." Gator Party had no such event permit for these secret campaign meetings.

On February 19th, 2020, at approximately 1:52 PM, Gator Party Student Body Vice President candidate Lauredan Offical maintained a "story" on Instagram showing Gator Party campaign material, including imagery of Offical captioned with text reading "Go vote for my guy @officialborn!! Hardworking. Committed. Couldn't imagine anyone else"; clearly indicating the material's association with Gator Party and Offical's candidacy. The "story" is campaign material per §700.4(f), as it contains content supportive of Gator Party and Offical, including imagery and text praising Offical. The "story" did not include the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections, as required by §762.0. Therefore, a violation of §762.0 occurred.

§762.0 states "Candidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material. In addition, all campaign material must be registered with the Supervisor of Elections or his or her Assistant Supervisors of Elections prior to the time of distribution. Procedures for distribution and posting of campaign material not provided for by the Student Government Election Code may be established by the Supervisor of Elections or by the Elections Commission. However, such procedures shall not be inconsistent with the Student Government Election Code and they shall not be effective unless presented in writing to the candidates and registered political parties twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time that any such procedures take effect."

§700.4(f) states "(f) "Campaign Material" means any print or electronic material used for the purpose of supporting a candidate or political party for an elective Student Body office, an initiative, a referendum question or proposed constitutional amendment. "Campaign material" shall include, but not be limited to, fliers, banners, posters, placards, electronic mail internet posts, and clothing".

Describe what happened (be specific - include time and dates):

Violation of 700.4(k) and 761.1

On January 20th, 2020, by 11:59 PM, Gator Party illegally engaged in campaign activity before the election cycle began by soliciting \$381.80 worth of balloons, violating §700.4(k) and §761.1.

§700.4(k) defines the election cycle as "the time from the beginning of the informational meeting held by the Supervisor of Elections pursuant to 713.0 until validation of the election by the Student Senate".

§761.1 mandates that "Campaign Activities begin on the first day of the active election cycle and ends immediately after the close of polls on the final day of elections."

§700.4(d) defines campaigning as "any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office, including, but not limited to the distribution of literature and posting of election specific materials. "Campaigning" does not include maintaining a website excluded to providing general information about the party and party members, or wearing campaign material, as defined in 700.4(f), a campaign shirt, a button, an emblem or similar paraphernalia, unless accompanied by the dissemination of campaign literature or the delivery of a campaign speech to solicit support for a candidate or political party."

§700.4(e) defines Campaign Activity "as interchangeable with "Campaigning" and will be interpreted as having the full meaning ascribed in § 700.4(d) as per 2013-SC: Students Party v. Swamp Party decision."

The election cycle began on January 21st, 2020, at 6:30 PM, when the informational meeting held by the Supervisor of Elections pursuant to §713.0 began. Engaging in campaign activities prior to the beginning of the election cycle is prohibited. Gator Party received an invoice for these balloons dated to January 20th, 2020.

Soliciting balloons for a campaign expenditure is a form of "any intentional action in support of, or in opposition to, a candidate or political party for an elective student body office", per §700.4(d), as the balloons were used in pursuit of Gator Party's campaign purposes. Thus, Gator Party engaged in prohibited campaign activity by receiving an invoice for these balloons \$381.80 of balloons before the start of the election cycle.

Because Gator Party solicited balloons from Fabulous Faces Entertainment before the Spring 2020 election cycle began, Gator Party engaged in prohibited campaign activity in contravention of §700.4(k) and §761.1.

On February 2nd, 2020, at approximately 8:46 PM, Gator Party "acting president" Cady Jean Casellas maintained a "story" on Instagram showing Gator Party campaign material, including imagery of Gator Party executive candidates Trevor Pope, Lauredan Offical, and Jessica Jesurajan (the latter two dressed in Gator Party shirts) with Gator Party Treasurer Gio Mompremier and Casellas. This "story" also includes text reading "Shout out to my @gatorpartyuf fam for coming out to support me at the Womxn's Leadership Conference tonight! [ORANGE HEART EMOJI]", thus sharing the Gator Party Instagram page. The "story" did not include the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections, as required by §762.0. Therefore, a violation of §762.0 occurred.

§762.0 states "Candidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material. In addition, all campaign material must be registered with the Supervisor of Elections or his or her Assistant Supervisors of Elections prior to the time of distribution. Procedures for distribution and posting of campaign material not provided for by the Student Government Election Code may be established by the Supervisor of Elections or by the Elections Commission. However, such procedures shall not be inconsistent with the Student Government Election Code and they shall not be effective unless presented in writing to the candidates and registered political parties twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time that any such procedures take effect."

§700.4(f) states "(f) "Campaign Material" means any print or electronic material used for the purpose of supporting a candidate or political party for an elective Student Body office, an initiative, a referendum question or proposed constitutional amendment. "Campaign material" shall include, but not be limited to, fliers, banners, posters, placards, electronic mail internet posts, and clothing".

On February 19th, 2020, at approximately 12:57 PM, Gator Party affiliated Senate Information and Communications Committee Chair Meryl Jones maintained a "story" on Instagram showing Gator Party campaign material, including imagery of Gator Party presidential candidate Trevor Pope standing with balloons which spell "HOPE", along with graphics which say "HAVE HOPE VOTE GATOR PARTY". Jones appears to have manipulated an originally registered graphic to include additional elements, including significant edits to the registered content's background imagery. Because the content within the "story" shared by Jones appears to have never been registered with the Supervisor of Elections, as required by §762.0, a violation of §762.0 occurred.

§762.0 states "Candidates shall ensure that all "campaign material" as defined in Section 700.4(f) shall be labeled with the phrase "Registered Political Advertisement" or a phrase of similar import approved by the Supervisor of Elections. The phrase shall be followed by the name of the individual who authorized the creation of, disbursement of, or payment for, a piece of campaign material. In addition, all campaign material must be registered with the Supervisor of Elections or his or her Assistant Supervisors of Elections prior to the time of distribution. Procedures for distribution and posting of campaign material not provided for by the Student Government Election Code may be established by the Supervisor of Elections or by the Elections Commission. However, such procedures shall not be inconsistent with the Student Government Election Code and they shall not be effective unless presented in writing to the candidates and registered political parties twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time that any such procedures take effect."
